In another column of the DISPATCH refer ence is made to the great Russian reformer and world wide known, Tolstoi. Since tha was written, Tolstol has been called to hi rest. His death seems to have stirred Ru sis to its depths, the peasantry regarding him with a'most idolatrous affection. Much that Tolstoi has written will be forget en in the ages to come, much will be remembered, and in a reformed Russia, in the near future, the seeds of his teaching will bear fruit. It is said that the key note of his life was summar ized in this remark by him :---

"How can I sleep on matrasses and feather beds, when hard working men have not even straw? If you were Christians you could not. What right have you to too much when your brother has act even enough?"

The views regarding death which he has so recently expressed an his desire to avoid the world calls to mind the reply he made to a friend who sought to congratulate him on his eightieth birthday. He then said:

"It is another happiness that I awaitdeath."


Iu a later letter to the Paris Matin he add ed that all this life is a dream and death is the awakening.

"Our estaly life is one of the dreams of another and more real life," he wrets. "And that life is a dream of yet another life, and so on, al infinitum, even to the last life, the life of God."

In his autobiography he says:

"I would divide my life into four periods -the innocent, joyful, poetic period up to fourteen; then those dreadful twenty years. the period of coarse dissoluteness of service, of ambition and vanity, and above all of sensuoness; next the eighteen years during which I have lived regular, honest, family life, yet a period all the interest of which is limited to egotistical family cares to concern for the increase of wealth, the attainment of literary success and the enjoyment of every kind of pleasure, and the fourth period in which I now live and hope to die, from my past life."
