**Miner's Strike.**

New York, March 31—Three hundred thousand organized miners in the bituminous coal fields, of Pennsylvania, Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Iowa, Missouri, Kansas, Oklahoma and Arkansas, quit work to-night. The miners, members of the United Mine Workers of America, declared the walkout was not a strike, but merely a suspension of work pending an arrangement between themselves and the operators, of a wage scale for another year—the old scale having expired with the month of March. The men demand an increase of pay in some instances of five cents a ton, and in other instances, more, and certain changes in working conditions.

**O'Brien's New League.**

Cork, March 31—A large and enthusiastic meeting at city hall today, inaugurated the "All For Ireland League," the object of which William O'Brien, M. P., said in the course of a long speech, was to enable the Irish people to choose between his policy which reconciles Catholic and Protestant fellow countrymen, and John Redmond's which sets them against each other.

Mr. O'Brien characterized the Nationalist party as "a mere puppet, detestable sectarian secret society, whose avowed purpose was to build up a system of Catholic Orangeism more inexcusable than its Protestant forerunner."

Lords Donraven, Rossmore and Castletown sent letters approving the movement.

**Fredericton's Soldiers Leaving.**

Fredericton, March 31—Major J D Dowe arrived from Halifax this morning and took over command of No 3 regimental depot, in succession to Major Fiset. The transfer of stores was made under the supervision of Lieut-Col. Humphrey, D. O. C. Major Fiset will leave tomorrow for Quebec, to which place he has been transferred.

Captain Dudomaine will leave for Halifax tomorrow evening with a draft of forty men who have been transferred from this depot to the Halifax garrison. It is understood that similar drafts are being made to Halifax from other depots.

**Higher Salary for Presbyterians.**

Toronto, March 30—The augmentation committee of the Presbyterian General Assembly decided at a meeting here yesterday, owing to the increased cost of living, to recommend to the General Assembly that fifty dollars be added to the minimum salary of all ministers, making the minimum in the east \$850, and that in the west \$950. The committee suggests that the increase be made effective from January 1st this year.

**Speaker Cannon a Bad Loser.**

One Joe Cannon, of Illinois, has been re-elected Speaker of the House of Representatives at Washington, but his high office has been at last robbed of its arbitrary powers.

For the past few years a party of independent Republicans has been growing up in the West, and under the name of "Insurgents" they have been, during the session that began on the fourth of March, making common cause with the Democratic members against the extension, and even the retention of the Speaker's prerogatives. Mr. Cannon has been fighting the allies "to the last ditch" with all the resources of personal ability, long experience, powerful support, and party patronage. The final issue was whether the Speaker should be put on the committee entrusted with the drafting of rules to facilitate the procedure of the House, Mr Cannon has been defeated. This makes him practically powerless to accomplish things he has been fighting for, one of them being the thwarting of the President's efforts to carry out the "Roosevelt politics."

**The Prime Minister Moves to Amend the British Constitution by Restricting the Lord's Power.**

London, March 29.—The House of Commons reassembled to-day after the Easter recess, and the first business before the House was the consideration of the Prime Minister's resolution in regard to the veto power of the House of Lords. The House was crowded, and there was a full attendance of members. The three resolutions which the Prime Minister laid on the table on March 21 declare in effect:—

First.—That it is expedient that the House of Lords be disabled by law from rejecting or amending a money bill, but that any such limitation shall not be taken to diminish or qualify the existing rights of the House of Commons.

Second.—That it is expedient that the powers of the House of Lords over bills other than money bills be restricted by law, so that any such bills which has passed the House of Commons in three successive sessions and has been rejected by the House of Lords in each of these sessions shall become a law without the consent of the House of Lords, on Royal assent being declared; provided that at least two years have elapsed between the date of the first reading of the bill in the Commons and the date when in the Commons for the third time.

Third.—That the duration of each Parliament shall be five years.
