CARVELL received a letter last week from the Minister of Justice in reference to the Kelly case, saying that he was in communication with Mr. Bryce, the British Ambassador at Washington, requesting that an official be sent down to make an examination as to the exact place where Mr. Kelly was arrested. Marshall Kelly forwarded the letter to Mrs. Kelly, at Debec. There is yet hope that it can be clearly proven that Mr. Kelly was taken from the Canadian side.

A DISPATCH from Andover states that William J. Ayop, an Assyrian merchant, charged with conspiring with his brother to defraud merchants in St. John, Halifax and elsewhere, was on March 13th convicted of the charge and sentenced by Judge Carleton to ten months imprisonment, and to pay a fine of \$800. He has already served two months in jail while awaiting trial and this will be deducted from his sentence. It will be remembered that a quantity of goods belonging to the accused were seized by Deputy Sheriff Winter at Canterbury last fall, and are in his custody at the county jail. They will now likely be sold and the proceeds turned over to the parties who were defrauded.

THE third annual meeting of the Farmers' Telephone Co., was held at Windsor March 7th. The directors elected were: Geo. Britton, Pres.; H. L. Dickinson, Vice-Pres.; Clyde Rideout, E. W. It is the intention of the company to extend their line to Waterville, Centreville, Florenceville, Northampton, Southampton, Knoxford, Jacksonville. They expect to spend \$1,000 this summer in construction work. The date of the annual meeting is to be changed to the second Monday in January. There was over \$3,000 worth of stock sold at the meeting.
