Asks Kelley's Release

Considering the legal machinery necessary in such cases the abduction case of William Kelley, of Richmond, (N. B.) is moving along quite rapidly. Your correspondent has read all correspondence in connection therewith. Kelley's lawyer, F. B. Carvell, M. P., having secured several affidavits from eye witnesses to prove that Kelley was arrested on Canadian territory and forcibly removed to Houlton, (Me.) thence to Portland, (Me.) had them promptly presented to Hon. Chas. Murphy, secretary of state for Canada who took the matter up with British Ambassador Bryce at Washington.

Mr. Bryce's letter to the United States Secretary of State Knox gives the facts of the case, asks that the affidavits be examined and requests that Mr. Kelley be released immediately from the federal prison in Atlanta, Ga., where, two weeks ago he was taken to serve a sentence of fourteen years for assault upon Customs Officer Burns. He also states that the question of compensation to Kelley for damages will also be taken up later. The reply of Hon. Mr. Knox, it is expected, will be received soon.
