Grand Junction, Col., Aug. 26.-The entire town of Dragon is to be moved twelve miles as a result of the completion of the Uintah Railway.

Dragon, now boasting 600 inhabitants, will be moved bodily on flat cars to Temple, which will be the new town. Hcuses, railroad shops, stores and all are to be transported. The expense will be heavy but the railroad officials declare that it will be cheaper in the end to have their facilities at Temple.

The Dragon residents are opposing the venture, but if the railroad shops and roundhouses are removed, the rest of the town will follow suit.

Negotiations are in progress for the removal of the roundhouse and other equipment. The new townsite is in Utah and Dragon will no longer be a postoffice in Colorado.
