W. C. T. U Officers Elected This Morning

FREDERICTON, Aug. 31.--The W. C. T. U. convention session on Wednesday afternoon opened with a Bible reading by Miss Smith, of St. John.

The report on the Y's was first submitted, and showed that this important branch of the work is not as encouraging as it should be. Miss Smith, the Dominion superintendent of the Y's donated \$5 to the Fredericton Y's for having secured the largest membership during the year.

The report on Sunday schools showed that in most counties where there are unions the quarterly temperance lessons have been used, and they have pledge cards.

The report on the Loyal Legions showed that there are only six of these in connection with the convention. It is claimed that the Sunday schools take the place of these organizations, but Mrs. C. L. Stephenson gave ringing testimony in their favor, stating that they are one of the best feeders for the advanced temperance societies.

Miss Stephenson gave a temperance reading and Miss Gatecombe a vocal solo.

Last evening, Mrs Stephenson delivered her lecture, "Snapshots--a Temperance Tour Around the World," in the audience room of the convention church and was listened to with much interest by a large audience. On her tour, she said, she visited all the principal countries of the world, giving one hundred and twenty-five addresses. The Japanese women, considering their opportunities, lead the world in temperance work, she said, although only a brief period emerged from heathenism, as there are now 3,000 of them enrolled in the white ribbon army.

The convention will close this evening with another public meeting. This afternoon there will be a memorial service and the final business meeting of the convention.

At this morning's session the report of the white slave traffic was presented on behalf of Mrs. Coleman, of Moncton, the superintendent of that department. The report showed that nearly all the local unions had taken up this important department of work, and literature had been widely distributed. During the discussion which followed cases were pointed out where men and women engaged in the traffic had been driven from communities where they had been canvassing.

The election of officers was then taken up, and Mrs J. H. Gray, of Fairville, the retiring president, thanked her fellow-workers for their sympathy and help during the six years of her presidency. The election of officers resulted as follows:

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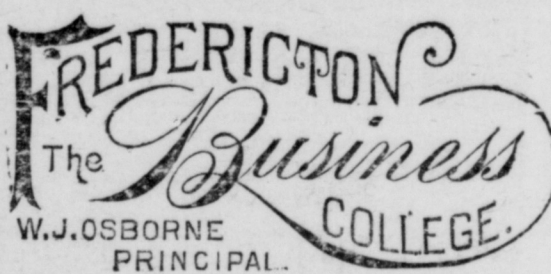

Railway Officials Consider Important Questions.

Chicago, Ill., Aug 31.--Members of the committee on relations among railroads of the American Railway Association, met here Wednesday and discussed employment situation on transportation lines in different parts of the country. The session was held behind closed doors and railroad officials declined to discuss any action likely to be taken in advance of the meeting. The policy of retrenchment and economical adoption by a number of roads which has resulted in the laying off of thousands of employees was considered, it is said, at the conference. The dispute with union labor, which has engaged the attention of railroad officials on a number of lines for several weeks, also was considered, according to report. The committee is composed of railroad officials and includes G. W. Brownlee, general transportation manager of the G. T. Railway.
