Spain's Danger.

(Boston Advertiser)

The continual mutterings of revolution in Spain must give cause for worry to King Alfonso and the upholders of the monarchical regime, for they mean something not to be skipped over, or handled by temporary suspension of the constitutional guarantees. The very methods now necessarily taken to enforce order and maintain the authority of the Madrid government are such as aggravate the conditions which further the demonstrations of hostility. The trouble is deep. With the example of Portugal across the border as an example of what can be done, the danger of a complete overturn in Spain is real and may become acute with short warning at any time. Fortunately for the present government of Spain, she has stronger men in her monarchical establishment than Portugal had preceding her revolution, and only by the wisest progressive statesmanship of these men may disaster to constituted authority be averted.

There is in Spain, as there was in Portugal before the revolution there, a balancing portion of the citizenship which, while opposed to disorder, would countenance revolution rather than continue under governmental oppression and inadequacy of citizenship rights according to modern ideas. Portugal's government ignored that element, and disaster came. Spain, by recognizing it, may turn from violent revolution to peacefully constructive governmental reorganization, and save a monarchy.

Nomination of candidates to be filed with the Parish Clerk, or to be left at his residence, at or before six o'clock p. m., on Monday the 2nd day of October instant.

Parish Clerk to post names of candidates in three of the most public places in each Polling District on or before Thursday the 15th day of October next.

Candidates names also to be posted up at the Polling places before the opening of poll on day of election.

The Parish Clerk or District Clerk (as the case may be) to act as Chairman, unless he refuses to serve, or is absent, or not competent by reason of relationship of candidate when chairman to be chosen by electors present.

Assessors are required to furnish Parish Clerks with list of electors.
