London, June, 2—The Marys throughout
the empire have contributed \$60,000 to the
queen's coronation gift. The donors range

Queen Mary's crown, with the blazing
Kohinoor and two sections of the Cullinan
diamond, designed by Garrard & Co., the
crown jewellers, was exposed to view yester-
day. Hundreds inspected it and also the
king's crown, which has been altered to fit
the head of the present monarch.

The queen's crown, which is the case with
nearly everything in this reign is all British
made, and a superb specimen of the jewellers
art. It weighs only nineteen ounces.
