### ORANGE PUDDING

Make a custard (cooking it in a double boiler) of one pint of milk, one tablespoonful of cornstarch; yolks of three eggs, three fourths of a cupful of sugar; it until it thickens. Then remove and set aside until it cools. Have the whites of three eggs in the meantime where they can cool. While the custard is cooling break three or four oranges into shreds, removing all seeds and pulp, and sugar well. Wipe up the egg white until stiff and fold gently into the custard; then lay on top the shredded orange after removing some of the juice, and serve with or without whipped cream

### A RARE JAPANESE IMAGE

London, Eng., June 6.—Lady Ward, who has accompanied her husband, Sir Joseph Ward Premier of New Zealand, on his visit to England, has expressed her views of English women in an interview, in which she declares she finds them very charming, but chilly. Lady Ward regards English women as being uglier rather than fatter than the matter of dress. Their clothes are made of the best materials but the best use is not made of the materials. Paris and the provinces and London follow, but there are always small modifications to be made to a general type of dress—personal touches that make the dress becoming to the wearer. English women seldom venture to strike this personal note. They never dress unfashionably, and not often with distinction. This Lady Ward holds to be due to the lack of self confidence, but English women are altogether charming and very shy.

### TERRIFIC SPEED IN FLYING MACHINE

PARIS, June 8.—L'Auto estimates the Vedrine, the winner of the Paris to Madrid race, whose proper name is Jules Vedrine, attained the prodigious speed of 155 miles an hour on Tuesday, covering the 77 510 miles separating Dijon and St Laurent Les Mines in thirty minutes. The paper quotes the aviator as saying that he was pushed by a wind so violent that at times he flew with the tail of his air machine perpendicular. He also encountered wind pockets that caused his monoplane to make frightful drops, sometimes descending 900 feet in a few seconds. Vedrine suffered only through the strain in his eyes.
