SCOTT ACT NEWS

The Scott Act case against Mr. Oldenburg of Debec has been adjourned until Thursday of this week commencing at 10 o'clock. Inspector Colpitts visited the boundary line on Thursday. The Merritt place is closed. The Thompson place is found occupied by three men and two women but on search nothing was found. A week ago Sunday there was a field fight between these parties and one man had his arm broken; as soon as the Inspector appeared the whole party took to the woods. The High Sheriff and deputy of Anticosti county met the Inspector, but as the people were not breaking the law on the American side of the line, the officers could do nothing.

Inspector Colpitts accompanied by Revenue Officer Bull and Constable Bull went to the boundary line at break of day last Sunday morning. The occupants of the house were on the watch and three men and two women took to the woods across the line; one of the men was found drunk. The horses and wagons were on the other side of the line. The Inspector sent them word that if they took the horses and wagons and left for good they could do so if not he would get the immigration officer and have them deported as undesirable citizens and let the officers from the other side of the line deal with them, as it was reported that they came from Bangor. They said that the place is owned by Joseph Lamb and that he is supplying them with the liquor for sale.

The officers remained several hours and the crowd began to come for liquor, but it soon left and all was quiet at 12 o'clock. Every pan of glass was broken in the house and the raid was made on Sunday on account of the riot that occurred the previous Sunday. Arrangements have been made with the officers on the other side of the line, and Chief Kelly and other officers on this side, that some day this week a joint raid will be made and those found on either side who cannot give a satisfactory account of themselves will be taken to jail.

TOWN COUNCIL

Council met on Friday evening at the usual hour. Present, Mayor Ketchum and a full board.

The minutes of the sessions of May 5th and June 5th were read and approved.

Coun Dibblee said that he and Coun Gallagher and G A White visited the town dump the other day and found the surroundings in bad shape. He thought that people using the dump should be prosecuted for not putting the rubbish on the dump. Mr White felt that the town has not used him right in allowing people to dump on his property. Mr White would give a deed of the land if the town would carry out the agreement made.

Couns Gallagher and Bailey spoke on the question, the latter not being willing to fence any part of Mr White's property, and favoring a board fence instead of a wire fence proposed by Coun Gallagher.

Coun Dibblee made a motion along the line suggested in his remarks. This was seconded by Coun Gallagher. It was withdrawn on the request of Coun Bailey.

Moved by Coun Bailey, seconded by Coun Mair, and passed, that the clerk be requested to draw up a deed between G A White and the town for the land used as a town dump, and that the special committee be authorized to put the dump in shape only and build a board fence in front and at end of town dumping lot.

His Worship said that Supt Harshaw had kindly offered to furnish a lot of stone for the rock crushing plant when it begins operation.

Moved by Coun Mair, seconded by Coun Gibson, and passed, that the question of purchasing the rock crusher and roller be left to a committee consisting of Mayor Ketchum and the street committee with power to act.

Coun Gallagher, on behalf of street committee, said he was in doubt whether the town had a right to repair the retaining wall in front of the Lindsay vacant lot. If it has to do so we can fix the wall by putting in a frame at the corner and filling in with cement.

Coun Bailey thought the town was not liable in any way for the flaw in the retaining wall. He would not vote one cent for repairs until the town council records were searched and it was proven that we were liable.

Coun Dibblee said that he understood that the owner had withheld a sum of money from the contractor until such time as it was proven that the work was well done. If that were so it was up to the contractor to complete his job and get his money.

Moved by Coun Bailey, seconded by Coun Gallagher, and passed, that the bill of Henry Walker of \$7.25, recommended by the board of health, be passed and that action be taken against the owner of the property or the party liable.

Moved by Coun Dibblee, seconded by Coun Gibson, and passed, that all bills be ordered paid as read.

Moved by Coun Bailey, seconded by Coun Gallagher, and passed that all salaries falling due be ordered paid, as read.

Moved by Coun Dibblee, seconded by Coun Gallagher and passed, that Supt Fields be instructed to lay a sewer on Pine street at an estimated cost of \$30.

Coun Bailey thought that when the grant is made to the band that the concerts be held on the Main street instead of Connell Park.

Coun Mair agreed with Coun Bailey. Last year the preference seemed to be for the Park. This year many are asking to have the concerts on Main street.

Coun Gibson said the intention was to have the concerts from the balcony of the Carlisle Hotel if Mrs Tabor was willing. The band is willing to play anywhere that the council wishes.

Moved by Coun Bailey, seconded by Coun Gallagher, and passed: That the band be paid \$200 for 16 concerts, one concert a week, eight or ten selections, to be played on Tuesday if fine, if not on Thursday, concert to commence not later than eight o'clock, on Main street, in place approved by Council, concerts to continue until last of September.

Moved by Coun Gallagher, seconded by Coun Dibblee and passed, that Stephen Green be appointed revisor for the year.

Moved by Coun Mair, seconded by Coun Bailey, and passed that John Stairs be appointed the other revisor for the year.

Moved by Coun Dibblee, seconded by Coun Gallagher, and passed, that a committee of the whole council, meet the chief of police and the principal assessor on Tuesday night, in the council chamber, to deal with the assessment list.

Moved by Coun Gallagher, seconded by Coun Dibblee, and passed, that A G Fields be appointed street commissioner at a salary of \$100. This motion was opposed by Coun Bailey who argued that

Supt Fields was paid a good salary and he had all he could do now to look after the water works and sewers.

Council then adjourned.

MILITARY CAMP

The First Field Co Canadian Engineers, formerly known as the Brighton Engineers, left by special train on Sunday morning to perform their annual drill at Petawawa. The Company is now under the command of Capt W W Melville its former commander Col Tompkins, having been retired. An advance party of fourteen men under command of Lieut Vince left for camp on Friday, to have things in shape for the main company upon their arrival Monday afternoon. The Company has an establishment of 180 men with 28 horses, about fifty men were trained here. The larger portion were taken on at Florenceville, its former headquarters Dr Fokias of Stanley was attached as Surgeon and reported for duty on Saturday. Lieut Barpee Hay left on Sunday with the rest of the company. This is the first time the Co have been called upon to perform drill outside the province but at Petawawa, they will come in contact with the other Engineer Companies of Canada and in the competitive work which will be performed will no doubt make a good showing. The Camp will continue for sixteen days.
