MRS E PORTER ROSS

Martha Everett, widow of the late E Porter Ross of Riley Brook, N B, died at her home in that place Tuesday evening June 6th after an illness of about 18 months. She had undergone a paralytic shock, and during the past year and a half has been almost or quite helpless.

The funeral was held at the home Thursday June 8th, interment by the side of the body of her husband at Riley Brook.

Mrs Ross was born in Andover about 65 years ago, and was the daughter of the late William Everett and Rebecca Ross. She married E Porter Ross about forty five years ago. His death occurred about two and a half years ago.

Mr and Mrs Ross had nine children, of whom six are living, as follows: Reuben, at Riley Brook; Retta, (Mrs James Dorsey), and Bird, Fort Fairfield; William, Ray, (on the old homestead), and Bedford, Riley Brook. She also leaves three sisters and two brothers.

Mrs Ross was a very active, neighborly and kind hearted woman, and leaves behind her a multitude of good works and the kindest of remembrances—Fort Fairfield Review.

REV DR CAMPBELL JOINS MT A FACULTY (St John Telegraph)

Methodists all over Eastern Canada will be interested in the announcement that Rev George M Campbell D.D., district secretary of the Canadian Bible Society, has accepted the offer of a professorship at the University of Mount Allison College and will take the chair of homiletics practical theology at the beginning of the college year next autumn. At the annual meeting of the board of regents of the University, held May 31, Dr Campbell was elected a professor and assigned to the chair mentioned. He has since had the call under consideration and yesterday reached a decision and notified the authorities of the college of his acceptance and his readiness to enter upon the duties as soon as an honorable discharge could be secured from the Canadian Bible Society, whose energetic and very efficient secretary he has been for six years.

The chair of homiletics and practical theology to which he has been assigned is one of the most important in the university and was left vacant by the death of Rev Dr Stewart last year.

Dr Campbell has served at Sussex, Nashwaak, Fredericton, Newcastle, Woodstock, St Stephen, Moncton, Charlottetown twice, Pownal and Exmouth street, Centenary and Queen square, this city. He was born at Wallace, Cumberland county (N. S.), and as he was educated in the maritime provinces he understands the conditions and needs of this part of Canada and is eminently qualified for the responsible position to which he has been called. With the exception of eight years he has been constantly engaged in ministerial work in New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island since 1871.

Mrs Campbell is a daughter of the late Rev H McKeown and a sister of Mr Justice McKeown, of the supreme court of New Brunswick.

ABRAHAM SCHRIEVER OF CAMPBELL SETT ACCIDENT TALLY KILLED

Mr Abraham Schriever, a well-known resident of Campbell Settlement, Parish of Southampton, was the victim of a fatal accident on Saturday afternoon. One of the wheels of a truck wagon on which he was riding struck the plank covering of a culvert with such force as to throw him off. He was caught beneath the hind axle of the wagon and had his back broken.

From particulars of the sad affair to hand it seems that Mr Schriever had been hauling lumber at Woodman's mill and was returning to his home when the accident occurred. The truck wagon on which he was riding has low axles and he was sitting on the stretcher at the time the accident occurred. Near Howard Stairs corner there is a culvert the planking of which projects about eight inches above the road. Mr Schriever did not notice this until one of the front wheels of the wagon brought up against it with such force as to throw him from his position. He was caught behind the hind axle and his body so badly wrenched that his back was broken.

After the accident occurred the horses continued on without a driver for some distance and were stopped by a man going in the opposite direction. Recognizing Mr Schriever's team and thinking that some accident had befallen, he turned the horses about and had not proceeded far when he found Mr Schriever lying upon the road unconscious. The unfortunate man was immediately removed to his home and made as comfortable as possible until Dr Coffin arrived in response to a message. The physician found upon examination, that the patient's body was paralyzed from the shoulders downwards. He was restored to consciousness and was able to recognize and converse with members of his family. He lingered until twelve o'clock Sunday, when death put an end to his sufferings.

The terrible accident has cast a gloom over the community and much sympathy is felt for the bereaved family. Mr. Schriever was widely known and respected in the up-river parishes and will be much missed. In religion he was a Reformed Baptist and in politics a moderate Conservative.

The deceased was about sixty years of age and is survived by a widow, who was a daughter of the late C. L. Grant, two sons and two daughters. The sons are Daniel at home, and David in the west, and the daughters are Mrs. Melbourne Dunham of Saskatchewan, and Mrs. Angus McBean of Nashwaak.

MRS EDMUND TOMPKINS,

The death of Mrs Edmund Tompkins of Florenceville occurred at the home of her son Benjamin on May 29. Mrs Tompkins was one of the early settlers of Florenceville. In youth she became a Christian and united with the Baptist Church. For many years she has been ill but bore her suffering very patiently and her hope was bright to the end and died trusting in Jesus. She leaves to mourn two sons Benjamin at home and Bruce at River Bank also two daughters Mrs Charlie Smalley and Mas Edward Waugh both of Florenceville besides a large concourse of friends to mourn their loss.

The funeral services were held on Wednesday afternoon and were conducted by Rev C S Young, pastor of the church at Windsor. Mr Young took for his consoling discourse Job 19: 25. 'I know that my Redeemer liveth'.
