WOODSTOCK EXHIBITION

The Woodstock Exhibition, which was held last week, opened on Tuesday and closed on Friday. There were not as many entries as usual, owing to the unfavorable weather and also to the fact that there were no special prizes.

THE SCHOOL EXHIBIT.

Friday, 29th, was Children's Day, and as usual was deserving of the name. From all parts of the County came pupils and teachers, especially interested in the School Exhibit. This Exhibit was one of the best features of the Fair. The number of competing schools was not so large as usual; but on the whole, the work showed a higher standard of excellence. Since this feature was introduced we have seen a gradual improvement in the taste displayed in the work entered. Undoubtedly the limited numbers of entries this year was, in part, due to the late date of publication of the School Prize List.

The First Prize for general excellence was awarded the Jacksonville Superior School of which Miss Gaynell E. Long is principal. The showing from this school was certainly most commendable. The teacher has reason to be proud of her school, and the district has still greater cause to be proud of the teacher.

The Second Prize was carried off by Broadway and the Third Prize went to the College. In the case of the College, it can be readily understood that the conditions this year were not at all favorable to work of this nature, and under the circumstances the teachers have a reason to feel badly that theirs did not take the first place as usual.

Only two schools, Florenceville Consolidated and Woodstock, entered Manuel Training exhibits, and all the work displayed was of a high order of merit. On Thursday Miss Smith, the Woodstock instructor, gave a lesson in the Exhibition to a class of boys, which proved of intense interest to a large number of spectators.

Unquestionably, the School Exhibit as a whole, was a success, but there are some ways in which we think it could be improved upon another year. In the first place, get the School Prize List out early. If collections are to be made this is better begun early in the Spring. Then have the exhibits in early and judged and arranged before Children's Day arrives. A larger space should be allotted the school work so that it may be seen to better advantage, and it should be protected from being handled.

THE CREAMERY EXHIBIT.

In the Dairy Produce section an exhibit which called forth many admiring remarks was the display of the Creamery Company with the sign: "Dairying, the business which improves the land and brings in a Steady Income" and "The Woodstock Creamery Co. which makes dairying on a larger scale possible and profitable" followed by figures showing the rapid growth in the amount of business done by this firm during the past three years.

In the mossy background of the booth were represented two miniature lakes bearing flocks of swans while in the foreground boxes of butter as packed for export and topped with tiny wheat sheaves were flanked by wrapped prints for retail trade and, still more tempting, an array of little yellow pats ready to add the finishing touch to a breakfast table. Mr. Ransom, the manager of the creamery, tells us that the credit for this exhibit belongs to all the farmers who supply cream as much as to himself and his staff, so we have pleasure in congratulating the farmers of this county whose enterprise made such a pleasing display possible.
