### The Right Thing

To remove unslightly scratches form mahogany furniture caused by pins belts etc., make a brazil or pecan nut meat and rub well on scratch.

Cocoanut Balls. - Beat a quarter of a pound of butter and a quarter pound of sugar to a cream: add three well beaten eggs and sift in two ounces of flour; beat till quite smooth and light; then add a quarter of a pound of coaoanut. Pour this into a round cake tin lined with buttered paper. Bake thirty minutes in a moderate oven; lift carefully out and remove the paper. When cold, stamp out in rounds with a plain cutter about two inches in diameter. Whip up half a pint of thick cream until stiff; add one tablespoonful of vanilla extract and one tablespo onful of sugar: dip the rounds in the cream, sprinkle with cocoanut, and serve.

Soft Molasses Cake. - One cupful of molasses, one tablespoonful lard, one egg, one-half cup of water. small teaspoonful of soda, two cups of flour, pinch of salt. Same amount of coffee can be added instead of water. Also cup of raisins.



### Buttered Eggs

Beat up as many fresh eggs as you require, put a piece of butter in a saucepan, shake it one way until melted, add two tablespoons of cream' put in the beaten eggs, and stir constantly until they become thick. Have slices of hot buttered toast on which to pile the eggs.

### Beef Clives

Take three-fourths of a pound of tender beefsteak, one tablespoonful of bread crumbs, one tablespoonful of chopped suet, three anchovies, one hard boiled egg, one teaspoon of chopped parsley, and one teaspoonful of grated lemon rind. Cut the beef into thin, even sized slices. Put the range enough to satisfy the most eager anchovies, chopped egg, parsley, suet, and venturesome spirit.---Washington lemon rind and bread crumbs into a basin, season with salt and pepper to taste, and add enough beaten egg to bind them together. Put a little of this forcemeat into each slice of beef, then roll it up and tie loosely with

string. Put these "olives" into a saucepan and add enough stock to cover them, then let them stew gently for three-quarters of an hour. There them with gravy and baked tomatoes.
