Sermon From Shakespeare

And you all know security
Is mortal's chiefest enemy.

Macbeth, Act II., Sc. 3.

The witches in Macbeth are the em-
bodiment of the evil influences of the
external world which are ready to prey
upon unwary wavering, or wickedly-
inclined souls. Banquo and Macbeth
were equally tempted in the first
place. Banquo resisted and kept a
clean conscience; Macbeth yielded,
and, from a trusted subject and noble
soldier, became a disloyal traitor and
murderous villain. He thought that
by tyranny and slaughter he could sit
secure on the throne of Scotland. He
sold himself to the powers of dark-
ness, and they determined to lead him
on to his destruction. A sense of se-
curity was to be his chief enemy. By
their prophecies they gave him a con-
fidence that was to be his undoing.

A feeling of security has been the
cause of the downfall of many kings
and statesmen. Caesar felt secure in
Rome. He stood aloof from men of his
own stamp. He was a star of which
there was no fellow in the firmament.
When Artemidorus attempted to warn
him of his danger the strongest ex-
pression used was, "Security gives
way to conspiracy." Carelessness,
lack of caution on Caesar's part was
enabling Cassius and the other con-
spirators to make head against him.
Cromwell's success was due to the
fact that he never felt secure. He was
always on his guard. Had Caesar
been a Cromwell the daggers of the
assassins would never have reached
him. Before the battle of Agincourt
the French troops spent the night in
merriment and feasting, the English
in watching and prayer.

"Secure in soul

The confident and over-lusty French
Do the low-rated English play at dice."
Despite their vast superiority in
numbers the French, through their
sense of security, their over-confi-
dence were defeated by the watchful
English.

It is not necessary to go to ancient
history for illustrations of the evil ef-
fect of over-confidence. A sense of se-
curity caused the British tremendous
loss of life and treasure in South Afri-

ca. A sense of security had much to
do with the defeat of the Russian Go-
liath by the Japanese David.

In business life it is the same. The
manufacturer is successful. He has
built up a prosperous industry. He
grows over-secure in his own mind.
He forgets that reverses may come.
He spends extravagantly, building
palaces and purchasing pleasures that
enervate. When reverses come he
has not a sufficient rest fund laid aside
and finds himself ruined. Even the
farmer does not escape the evils of
over-confidence. He has moiled and
toiled to clear his ground. His broad
acres are in seed and a bountiful har-
vest is promised. On the expectation
of his crop he borrows and spends.
Debt grows while the crop is growing.
There comes a blighting frost, hail de-
pends upon his fields and in a night
the product of the labor of months is
destroyed. But his debts do not cease

Every individual has witch-like

greater the risk the more secure they
feel, and in an evil moment often mis-
appropriate funds in their control; and
the witches that hover over the stock
exchange and the race-track laugh
demoniacally as they prepare their
hell-broth for other victims.

So with sins of the flesh! Security,
over-confidence has been the downfall
of thousands. Men feel secure in
their strength of will. They indulge
in pleasures which, in moderation, may
be harmless but which, if practised to
excess, are baneful. Unless they are
continually on their guard, ever watch-
ful, their feet will slip and their pow-
ers of resistance become weakened.
St. Paul gave excellent advice to man-
kind when he said, "For when I am
weak, then am I strong." There is al-
ways hope for a man who has his eye
on the weak spots in his character.
Men subject to temptation cannot af-
ford for one moment to cease to guard
against the tempter. The battle is
not to the physically and numerically
strong; it is to the watchful. A pyg-
my continually on guard has an im-
mense advantage over a giant that
sometimes sleeps. The individual who
recognizes how fallible he is, who ex-
pects, but does not fear plots, con-
spiracy, misfortune, is better fitted to
fight the battle of life than one who
is over-confident. When storms come
to the latter and beat upon his house
he will find that he has builded on
shifting sands. Only eternal watch-
fulness makes nations or men secure.
The nations who look to their fleets
and armies in time of peace are the
most likely to be the successful ones
in time of war. The runner who keeps
his body in training before a race is
the one who usually wins the prize.

Run On English Penny Bank To-Day

LONDON, Nov. 7.—A run by foreign
small depositors on the Stepney branch
of the National Penny Bank, Ltd., has
been accompanied with scenes of excite-

ment over rights for vantage points in
the waiting line of those wishing to
withdraw their funds. Frequently the
police cordon was rushed and broken to-
day, and it was some time before the
crowds were under control. So far as
can be ascertained, there was no founda-
tion for the rumors which caused the
run. The depositors are being paid as
rapidly as the cashiers can hand out the
money.

New Island In The West Indies

PORT OF SPAIN, Trinidad, Nov.
7.—The new island which has risen from
the sea between here and Venezuela is
about three acres in extent, rising out
of the water to a height of from 8 to 10
feet. Before the upheaval the depth of
water at this spot averaged about
twenty feet. The Governor visited the
scene on Sunday, but was unable to ap-
proach the island very closely as fire
was still burning. It continued through-
out the day, but at night it seemed to
have burned itself out, only smoke ris-
ing. It was said to-day that residents
of the locality had been able to land on
the island.

The opinion is held here that the up-
heaval was caused by an explosion of
oil under anticlinal strata. The island
is composed of mud for the most part
and there is a distinct smell of oil. It
is just off the oil producing district and
close to the asphalt deposits.
