COUNTY COUNCIL

The Warden named Coun. F R Shaw to fill the vacancy in the Finance Committee caused by the absence of Coun. Hay.

Coun. Phillips regarding the proposed fence about the goal, thought a fence should be put there. The Sheriff was strongly of that opinion and he would like the council to view the lot and decide.

Coun. Melville spoke of the position of the photograph of the councillors. Mr Green, the photographer, was put in a hard position. A motion was carried that it be removed from the walls. Mr Green had made an improvement in the framing and he moved that the picture be put up in a suitable place in the Court House.

Coun. Brown seconded the motion. Coun. Kinney said while there was objection taken last year to the picture, this year an improvement has been made. Last year he and his colleague looked very inferior, now they looked bright and brilliant, and the same of the rest of the councillors. (Laughter). Carried.

Coun. Balmain moved that the picture be hung in the hall at the entrance of the Court House.

Coun. Tompkins seconded the motion. Coun. Melville favored it being hung in the Main building.

Coun. Brown pointed out that if the picture was hung up high it would be difficult to see it. He thought that the Court House proper should be reserved for such pictures as the King and of presiding Judges. Motion carried.

The following bills and accounts were on motion taken up with the Warden in the chair in council as Committee of the whole: Following were ordered paid: Herbert Lindsay (Constable work) \$ 2.80 John R Tompkins (Sheriff) 60.2 Coun Smith asked as to an item for damage to a flag that was in the bill.

Coun Brown—Before we get our flag, the flag from the Carlisle Hotel was borrowed and it became damaged by the rain. John R Tompkins (garage) \$254.76 Coun Morgan wanted to know what portion of the bill would be chargeable to the Scot. Act.

Coun Scott—It seems that this County Council could arrange it somehow that these prisoners could be put to work, especially as the town is getting a stone crusher with a view of permanent streets.

Coun Estey—We would have to have a guard to watch over the men, and this expense would effect the board bill.

Coun Williams would favor putting these men to work but he did not see how it could be done unless a yard was made and fenced about. He favored the idea.

Coun Scott spoke again in favor of the proposition. Coun Kinney—I think it right that the prisoners should be made to work and if this was done we would have less prisoners. If they were placed at hard labour there would not be half as many seeking protection and shelter. They men came because their confinement was made easy.

Coun Smith—I don't like to have this continued. Coun Shaw rose to a point of order. The discussion is out of order.

Warden ruled discussion out of order and bill was ordered paid. Thomas Jensen \$ 9.40 Bill ordered paid at 4 45 C T Boyer (Constable) 15 00 Coun Williams complained that the bill was made out in proper form. He moved amendment that the bill be laid out for further consideration.

Coun Melville thought the bill could be suitably explained. Coun Tompkins said that in view of the special circumstances the mileage would have made the bill out larger. It was a very difficult proposition to keep run of the mileage, and he believed the bill was very reasonable.

Coun Melville said Mr Boyer performed his work. He chased this man Cullens, and as he knew the case the bill was reasonable. Coun Tompkins said that by taking Dr Ross instead of a Doctor from Woodstock

and a constable from near about, mileage was saved and expense generally was saved. Coun Williams said that it was the principle of the thing he objected to. Coun Brown thought if the Councillors from the parish agreed to the bill it was all right. Coun Melville was a chronic kicker. Coun Smith would like the opinion of the sec treas.

Coun Perry said Coun Brown must remember this bill came from a rate payer of Coun Melville's parish. He thought the bill reasonable however.

Coun Kinney favoured Coun Williams amendment. Amendment lost and bill ordered paid. Charles T Boyer (Overseer of the poor) \$20.18

(This was for the burial of a pauper, I Adams.) Coun Melville—This man was found drowned in our parish. After inquiring we decided to bury him, as he had no friends, and the only alternative was to carry the body adrift. He thought this should be a County charge.

Coun Balmain was of the opinion that this family of Adams in Victoria County was not in indigent circumstances.

Coun Tompkins—We had quite a time to identify this man. Dr Ross deemed an inquest unnecessary, and advised the overseers to take the matter in charge.

The Coroner learned that this was Adams from Tobique. As to the condition of the Adams' I find his family and he were simple minded. After we prepared the man for burial we telephoned everywhere to find if any one claimed him but nobody did, and we buried him. It looks as if Victoria County or the parish might claim the bill.

Coun Balmain—Did you find out the fellows first name. Coun Tompkins I did not. Coun Phillips was against paying the bill if the man's family were not able to pay the Parish should.

Coun Shaw did not question the action of the Councillors or of the Coroner, but he questioned the right of this council to pay the bill.

Coun Melville thought from the way the discussion went, it looked as if the councillors thought they should have left the body at the river. The council had established a precedent before.

Sec treas—Carleton County would have no claim on Victoria County, but the parish would have a right to receive money if they paid it and it was their duty to bury the body, to afford temporary relief.

Coun Williams was of Coun Shaw's opinion. We have had paupers in our parish whose bodies drifted into the country. We notified them to take temporary care and then we paid the bill.

Coun Scott—If deceased was not a resident of Victoria County it was his opinion the county could pay the bill. The councillors could put that out.

Coun Tompkins—We pretty well understand the law as pointed out by the Sec Treas. We do not want to be too strict, we do not believe the law should be repeated otherwise drowned men will be pushed off the shore where they land. He looked for the Council not to be too strict.

Coun Scott wanted the parish of Peel to try and get the bill out of Victoria County. Coun Melville—Here is a transient man coming in and the expenses coming on us. It is hard where we have made our appropriation for our regular poor. He thought this should be made a county charge.

Coun Shaw said that this was a transient pauper. He was a resident of some parish in Victoria but drifted into the parish of Peel. The councillors of Peel seem to have established the residence of this man, at last, to their own satisfaction. An action could be brought against them and he did not think there would be any doubt of the recovery of the money from the Victoria parish. We have not established a precedent but we have paid bills of this sort out of kindness and in those cases residences could not be established.
