"The Countess de Swirsky possesses the most musical body in the world," is the verdict of Arturo Toscanini, leader of the New York Metropolitan Opera House Orchestra. This has been confirmed by a number of other celebrated artists who have expressed their admiration of her beauty and talents in marble and bronze and on canvas. Prince Troubetsky, of Paris, has made two wonderful statuettes, in bronze, of the Countess. One of them is on exhibition at the Chicago Museum of Arts and the other is in the Modern Art Gallery of Rome, Italy. Tozzi, the famous Italian Portrait Painter, has painted two very remarkable canvases of her, and the sculptor, Peary, of New York, has made a marble statue of her. The Countess de Swirsky will appear in a repertory of classic dances at the Hayden-Gibson Theatre on Tuesday Oct 31st. The Countess carries with her a special orchestra.

DEAF AND DUMB SCHOOL
