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Rev. Dr. Gibson Gets A Call

Presbyterian Church at Montreal
Wants the Popular Pastor of St.
Stephen's Church.

The Montreal Daily Witness of Saturday last says:

"At a meeting last night of the congregation of St. Matthew's Presbyterian church, it was unanimously decided to call Rev. L. B. Gibson, of St. Stephen N. B., to the charge.

Rev. L. B. Gibson is a native of Ireland, where he received his literary and university training. Coming to Canada, he graduated in theology from the Presbyterian College, Halifax, and Knox College, Toronto, where he received the degree of Bachelor of Divinity.

He was ordained in Glassville, N. B., May 4th, 1904, and after a postgraduate course in Glasgow, Scotland, where he was also assisted in Blackfriars' Church he accepted a call to St. Stephen's Presbyterian Church, St. Stephen, N. B. and was inducted on May 23rd, 1907.

Rev. Mr. Gibson is not a stranger to St. Matthew's congregation, having filled the pulpit during the month of August, 1910, and also of this year, very acceptably, so that last evening the congregation of St. Matthew's extended a unanimous call to him to become their pastor.

The delegates appointed to sustain the call at the St. John Presbytery were Principal W. A. Kneeland, Dr. J. C. Sharpe and David Thompson."

St. Matthew's is one of the leading Presbyterian churches of Montreal with a membership of over seven hundred and a Sunday school enrollment of about the same number, and a call to its pastorate would be esteemed a high honor to men who had been much longer in the ministry than has Dr. Gibson.

Extending a call to a Presbyterian pastorate is a somewhat involved process. It must first go before presbytery before reaching the pastor, hence it will be some weeks before this one reaches Dr. Gibson and until it is formally received a decision on its acceptance or rejection could not be given.

Rev. Mr. Gibson's pastorate in St. Stephen has been singularly successful. He has been faithful in his ministry and energetic in every branch of the church's work and the result of his labors is abundantly evident in his congregation.

His genial and kindly manner and his earnestness of purpose have greatly endeared him to his own people and the community as a whole, and while it is

realized that the wider field of city parish would afford greater scope for his boundless energy in the Master's cause, his acceptance of the present call would be generally regretted.

To Protest Laurier's Soulanges Election

Ottawa, Nov. 3.—Sir Wilfred Laurier has been served with papers in connection with the protest against his election in Soulanges. The protest is based on the usual grounds of irregularity by agents. Pending the outcome the ex-premier cannot choose whether he will sit for Quebec East or Soulanges.

Three Quarters of a Million Dollar Fire

London, Ont., Nov. 3.—The most destructive fire in London in a quarter of a century completely destroyed six of the largest business houses this morning.

At six o'clock all the six places had been burned out: Purdom Hardware Company, J. H. Chapman & Company, Kingmills, Maras, Brewsters & Roome, and Corbett & Company. A little after that time the firemen got control of the blaze. That the fire was not more far reaching in its destruction is due altogether to the excellent efforts of the firemen, and the great pressure furnished by the new water system.

Some of the firemen suffered numerous small cuts from glass, but nothing serious. Bricks bounced off the pavement into the windows of a house opposite, smashing a score of plate glass fronts. A late estimate places the loss at \$750,000, with insurance of \$600,000. Approximately 600 people are thrown out of work.

Stolen Cash Was Under Sidewalk

Vancouver, B. C., Nov. 2.—About twenty-five thousand dollars of the money recently stolen from the Bank of Montreal at New Westminster has been recovered. The money was found this afternoon under the sidewalk in front of Dr. Walker's house on Fourth street, New Westminster. It was discovered by George McCleary, foreman for a power construction company, which has the contract for laying a new sidewalk along Fourth street. Men engaged on the work had torn up an old board sidewalk when they came upon the money, \$4,380 of which was in gold, contained in a sack stolen from the bank. The remaining twenty thousand was in new \$5 and \$10 bills. McCleary at once notified the police and the money was removed to the Bank of Montreal. More important developments are expected.

Seven Girls Killed In Powder Factory

CHEHALIS, Wash., Nov. 1.—Fire which destroyed the powder factory of the Imperial Powder Co., here late today caused seven young women employed in the factory to lose their lives and an eighth probably will die. Only two girls escaped, although a dozen men were unhurt.

The cause of the fire is a mystery. One report is that a pot of paraffine in the mixing room was allowed to boil over by a careless workman and that part of it ran into some powder. A flash followed and soon the whole structure was ablaze.

The girls were hurled together and owing to the rapid spread of the flames could not escape from behind a counter on which they were working. Four of the company's buildings were destroyed, together with equipment and many tons of manufactured powder, entailing a financial loss of \$20,000 or more.

The Big Interests And Taft

It is The Big Interests that elected Taft and defeated Bryan in 1908. Signs are not wanting that these Interests are now preparing to turn on Taft as like Interests turned on Laurier last September. The cause of the antagonism to Taft is found in the enforcement of anti-trust legislation. The present disposition of Big Business seems to be to join with the Democratic party provided that party will name Governor Harmon of Ohio as its candidate.

In an effort to remove a swelling in his throat that was troubling him, John Murphy, aged 37, a prisoner in the jail at Andover, cut his throat about nine o'clock Sunday morning and barely missed taking his life.



He used the knife with which he filled his pipe and made a deep incision four inches long on the right side of the throat, cutting into the larynx but missing the jugular vein by a scant margin.

Drs. F. N. Welling and G. B. Peat were quickly called and dressed the wound which required several stitches. Murphy refused to have an anesthetic administered and underwent the operation without comment.

It is believed since he attempted suicide that the man is insane. Yet he talks rationally at times although he has a peculiar stare in his eyes. Since his incarceration and excepting Sunday he has been an ideal prisoner. He appeared satisfied with his lot and barely asked for anything.

Murphy was taken to the Provincial Hospital for Nervous Diseases on Monday.

Customs Receipts for October

An Increase of Nearly Two Millions Over Previous Year

Ottawa, Oct. 31.—According to the Customs receipts for the month just ended, Canadian business men are stocking up for a record-breaking fall and winter trade. The Customs revenue for the month was \$7,698,296, an increase of \$1,885,771 over October of last year. This means an increase of over thirty per cent. in imports for the month. For the first seven months of the fiscal year the Customs revenue has been \$49,004,623, an increase of \$7,632,496 over the corresponding period of last year.—Globe.
