Canadian Northern Had Good Year

Toronto, Nov. 3— The Canadian Northern Railway report issued to-day shows a net surplus of \$694,823 for the year ending June 30 last. The gross earnings were \$16,360,712. Net earnings were \$4,990,346. The gross earnings show increase of 18.27 per cent and net earnings 14.87 per cent. During the year over 400 miles of new line were constructed, total mileage now being 3,731.
