CARLETON COUNTY RIFLE MATCH ON AVONDALE RANGE JULY 13TH AND 14TH

The marksmen of the county will hold their annual Rifle matches on the Avondale Range on the 13th and 14th of July Thursday and Friday.

Shooting to commence at 8:30 a.m. These matches are drawing larger crowd every year and the committee intend making the best one ever seen in the county.

In addition to the Irvine and Smith matches a merchants match will be on the programme this year. Every merchant in the County can give a prize if he wishes and the names will be published along with the winner of such prize.

Programme as follows

THURSDAY FIRST DAY

Extra Series 200 yds 8:30 to 9:30 a.m. Irvine Cup Match 9:30 to 12 o'clock a.m. First Stage of Merchants Match Shot in conjunction with Irvine.

AFTERNOON

Extra Series 500 yds 1 to 2 o'clock p.m. Irvine Cup Match 2 to 4 o'clock p.m. Smith Cup Match 4 to 6 o'clock p.m. Team Shot shot in conjunction with Smith Match.

SECOND DAY FRIDAY.

Extra series 600 yds 8:30 to 10 a.m. Irvine cup match 10 to 12 a.m. Second stage of Merchants Match shot in conjunction with Irvine.

AFTERNOON.

Extra series 800 yds 1 o'clock to 2:30 p.m. Smith Cup Match 2:30 to 5 p.m. Last stage of Merchants shot in conjunction with Smith Match.

Extra series are 5 shots each. No sighter. Entrance fee twenty five cents ammunition not included. Not more than two tickets shot in succession if there are others waiting to shoot.

Irvine Cup Match 7 shots and a sighter at each range 200, 500 and 600 yds entrance fee \$100. Smith Cup Match 10 shots and a sighter at each range 500 and 800 yds. Entrance fee \$1.00.

Team Cup Match 10 shots and a sighter at 500 yds entrance fee \$500 per team. Entrance fees will be increase 25% on all competitors who do not belong to a club having a team in the Team Match.

A cordial invitation is extended to all Marksmen of the Province especially the neighbouring Counties.

The Merchants match will be shot on ranges 200 600 and 800 yds No entrance fee. Ammunition will be for sale on the Range. Let every marksmen of the County come and enjoy himself for a couple of days Bring your grub and boil the kettle P R A rules to govern in all matches.

REV. J H MACDONALD HONORED BY ACADIA.

At the closing exercises of Acadia College the degree of Doctor of Divinity was conferred upon Rev John Howard MacDonald, pastor of the Brunswick Baptist church of this city. The Honor is a well deserved one and will be very pleasing to the reverend gentlemen's many Fredericton friends.

Rev. Dr MacDonald is a native of Margaree, Cape Breton and graduated from Acadia University in 1891. He was ordained the same year at Bass River, N S which was his first charge. He removed to Amherst in 1892 and became assistant pastor of the Baptist church at that place. Two years later he went to Newton, Mass, and completed a course in theology. Upon his return he was pastor at Woodstock for one year and then removed to Amherst where he remained for three years as pastor. He resigned to become principal of Acadia seminary, but gave up the latter position about ten years ago and accepted a call to Fredericton.—Mail.

Mr MacDonald has many friends in Woodstock who will be very much pleased at the honor conferred upon him.

Mrs J M Brayley, of Montreal was communicated with and it was found she had a cabinet photo which was a very good likeness of Mr McCoy, which she would lend. Mrs Brayley expressed her grateful appreciation of the desire on the part of his old pupils to do honor to her grandfathers memory.

The idea has been most warmly endorsed by the boys from far and near. One of them who, for the past 30 years, has been a resident of Kansas city, Mo, and is one of the most prominent lawyers of that place writing to an old schoolmate, said: If the point is ever reached where you are attempting to get a portrait of Mr McCoy for the school building, I trust I may be permitted to contribute a portion of the cost.

A few weeks ago it was decided to get a life-size photograph hand finished and framed in oak. The likeness is an excellent one and has been placed for the present at the Glasgow House where Mr W W Hay will be glad to advise of Mr McCoy's old pupils to examine it.
