## REV. J H MACDONALD HONORED BY ACADIA.

At the closing exercises of Acadia College the degree of Doctor of Divinity was confer red upon Rev John Howard MacDonald, pastor of the Brunswick Baptist church of this city The Honor is a well deserved gentlemen's many Fredericton friends.

Rev. Dr MacDonald is a native of Mar garee, Cape Breton and graduated from Acadia University in 1891. He was ordained the same year at Bass River, NS which was his first charge. He removed to Amherst in 1892 and became assistant pastor of the Bap tist church at that place. Two years later he went to Newton, Mass, and completed a course in theology, Upon his return he was pastor at Woodstock for one year and then removed to Amherst where he remained for three years as pastor. He resigned to become principal of Acadia seminary, but gave up the latter position about ten years ago and ac cepted a call to Fredericton .- Mail.
