INDIA'S WHEAT CROP.
Washington, June 15.—A bumper harvest
of wheat in British India, estimated at 369
000,000 bushels, surpassing all previous
yields and a record area sown to spring
wheat in Western Canada, where 90 percent
of the Dominion wheat is grown, giving rise
to seemingly extravagant estimates of prob-
able yield, are the features of the news an-
nounced by the United States Department
of Agriculture to day. In other respects for
agriculture in general made average season-
able progress.
In Argentina, the great wheat and flax
seed reporter of the southern hemis-
phere, the autumn sown crops have enter-
ed their first month of the trans equatorial
winter in vigorous condition, and on prob-
ably largely increased areas. The recently
gathered corn crop there turned out badly,
and little or no surplus will be available for
export. The corn crop of South Africa also
is reported damaged by drought and there
probably will be none for report.

HONORS FOR WOMEN.
The nearness of the Coronation has
turned the thoughts of many to the
subject of honors, and there is a
growing tendency to discuss the over-
looking of women when notable dis-
tinctions are being awarded. The
public work of women has been insuffi-
ciently recognized, and only as 'the
wives of their husbands' has honor
come upon them—and yet, says the
'Woman at Home,' their work in
many fields has made history, and is
making history. The suggestion of
a special order for women will not
meet with any great acclamation from
women who matter. The disinclina-
tion of the outstanding women to be
grouped according to their sex is a
growing one. In the arts and sciences
there is a universal demand on the
part of those who have shaken
themselves free of the amateur taint
to be grouped by right of their
achievement, and not in a special de-
partment apart by virtue of their
sex. Consequently any attempt to
initiate an honor for women which
will do homage to femininity as well
as to work is not likely to be welcom-
ed. But there is a growing feeling
that something must be done; there
are at the present moment women in
the front rank of the drama (both as
makers and interpreters), of music,
of literature, of the arts, and of medi-
cine, recognized as equal in standing
with those men whose names appear
on each new honors list, but who, be-
cause of their sex, have been passed
by. Beyond the occasional award of
medals to nurses one seldom sees a
woman's name in any civic list.
In connection with this almost gen-
eral feeling that there might be a
greater catholicity in the awarding
of distinctions, it is interesting to

note that Mrs Humphry Ward and
Mr George Bernard Shaw, who differ
so strongly on the question of the en-
franchisement of women, are agreed
that in the event of the formation of
a British Academy of Letters women
should be presented on the committee.
Mrs Humphry Ward declaring at the
annual meeting of the Society of
Authors that 'whatever her views as
to women in public affairs, she strong-
ly asserted the equality, or the poten-
tial equality, of women in matters
spiritual and intellectual.'

**INTERNATIONAL SUFFRAGE
CONGRESS**

The sixth congress of the Internat-
ional Women Suffrage Alliance open-
ing in Sweden on Monday, there be-
ing present a thousand delegates
from Europe, the United States, Aus-
tralia and South Africa. The address
of welcome was made by Mrs Anna
Whitlock, of Sweden, after which
Mrs Carrie Chapman Catt was re-
elected president of the alliance. Riks
dag Deputy Beckman spoke warmly
in favor of the suffrage for women.
and Mrs Catt gave a long and elo-
quent address on the history of the
movement. Mrs Frederick Nathan, of
New York, proposed the formation of
an association of Swedish men to
work for women suffrage.

The congress will sit until Saturday

Rice Souffle—Wash and drain half

spoon of vanilla or lemon extract.

bake in a buttered pudding dish
for half an hour. Serve immediately
after taking from the oven, with a
creamy sauce.

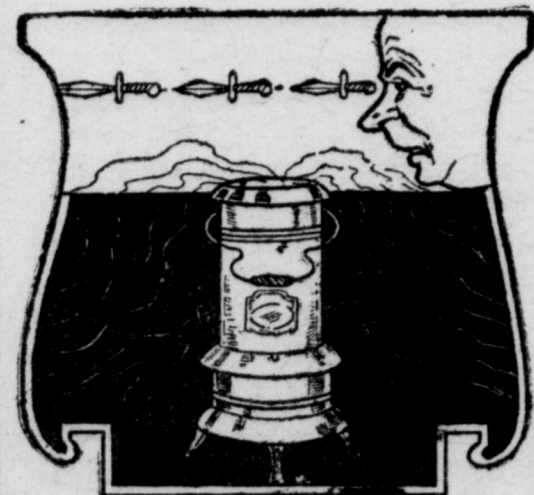
