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FRENCH SENATORS AGAINST MANUFACTURE OF ABSINTHE
(Canadian Press)

Paris, June 15.—The Senatorial Committee yesterday approved the La Motz bill prohibiting the fabrication and sale of absinthe. Statistics show that in 1874, 147,688 gallons of absinthe were consumed in France. In 1900 the consumption had jumped to 5,246,274 but decreased to 3,276,552 in 1910.
