COUNTY COUNCIL

Continued from last week

On being put to vote it stood: For the motion:—

Couns Hamphill, Lamont, Phillips, Gibson, Scott, King, Williams, Kinney, Keenan—9.

Against the balance of the councillors—12 Coun Burns King moved, seconded by Coun Williams, that A J Gibson be paid \$4 30. One payment is making returns for the parish of Wilmot.

The Warden spoke of the Union of Municipalities meeting and asked the council to deal with the matter.

Coun Belmain moved, seconded by Coun Brown, that Coun Williams be a delegate to the Union.

Coun Kinney favored the motion of sending Coun Williams, he would favor Coun Shaw also going to the meeting as a delegate. Coun Phillips was of the opinion of Coun Perry. He did not see the use of the Union.

Coun Melville—Last year I was against the thing. I do not see the benefits of the Union.

Coun Scott thought it would be only fair to send Coun Williams this time as he was on the Executive

Coun Shaw was never much taken up with this Union. He had failed yet to understand what there was to do at these gatherings. If we are going to stop this we might as well stop it now as at any time.

Coun Bell agreed with Coun Shaw. If we send a man I would believe in sending Coun Williams, but I believe in cutting it out. Motion was lost.

On motion of Coun Perry seconded by Coun Melville it was decided to rescind the vote of \$10 fee to the Union of Municipalities.

Coun Keenan moved seconded by Coun Kinney that Clements DeMerchant be appointed field driver and pound keeper for parish of Kent and Daniel Cronin collector of rates in place of Patrick Gorey who refused to act. Carried.

Coun Kinney brought up the case of a Mr Mitchell who claimed that he was wrong fully used in the officers taking Mr Mitchell's goods and chattels under what he regarded as illegal and unjust circumstances, Mr Mitchell was not accused of selling liquor, but his cow was seized. He asked the return of some \$13.00 which was the value of the "critter" seized.

Coun Kinney moved that this council pay back to Mr Mitchell \$13.50 and that it be charged to the parish of Kent. Carried.

Coun Gibson moved that Mr C P Bull be appointed a field driver, etc, for the parish Northampton. Carried.

On motion of Coun Smith, Frank Burpee was appointed a constable for the parish of Woodstock.

On motion of Coun Brittain George Prosser, Robert Brewster and Edmund Robinson were added to the list of field drivers, pound keepers, etc, for the parish of Brighton.

It was moved by Coun Keenan and seconded that a bill of \$13.30 of D C Bell, a bill as constable, left over from last session be paid.

Coun Perry—That bill was laid over for some reason. He moved in amendment that the bill be paid when the conditions upon which it was laid over for be fulfilled. Seconded.

Coun Melville thought that this bill should be further considered. He moved the bill be laid over that it be explained to the County Council Seconded.

Coun Kinney—The view I take we owe this bill or we don't; he did not believe any more would be known of this bill next January than now.

Coun Tompkins thought Mr Perry's amendment covered the whole question.

Amendment to the amendment lost Amendment carried.

On motion of Coun Shaw the Scott Act Inspector was heard:—

Mr Colpitts said that fourteen sellers have been driven out of the business since the last session of the council. Financially there was not much of a success as there was \$267 behind and expenses. In conversing with the old committee he found they did not consider themselves bound to act.

CHANCEL SCREEN.

St. Luke's church in this town has been further beautified by the addition to the many handsome ornaments, already within it, of a chancel or rood screen, the gift of Mr Charles F K Dibblee and his family to the memory of Mrs Dibblee, who all her life was an earnest worker in church affairs. The screen, which was something long desired, by those who had the architecture of the church at heart was ordered from Jones & Willis of London, England, whose excellence in church furnishings has been established for over a generation. Made of oak, part of the carving executed in America, it is a fitting complement to the roodcase, which was put in place as a memorial to Archdeacon Neales a few years ago, and was particularly constructed to correspond with it and with the general architecture of the church. It is rich in its very simplicity, and the carving is exquisitely done. The screen is surmounted with a Latin cross slightly ornamented. The whole effect is to greatly enhance the beauty of the church and to add warmth to the interior, entirely doing away with the somewhat austere aspect which was a characteristic of the interior before this addition to the ornamentation. A small brass plate bears this inscription To the Honour and glory of God and in loving memory of Adrianna Cecilia Dibblee Sept 8 1846—May 30 1910. Erected by her husband and children.
