CURRENT EVENTS

Canada has 100,000 Indians, according to latest statistics for the fiscal year. This is about the same number as shown by the count last year.

The Rev Dr Robert Stuart Mac Arthur of Calvary Baptist Church, New York City a native of Canada was elected president of the Baptist World Alliance now in session at Philadelphia.

In a message transmitted to Congress, President Taft scathingly arraigns the manufacturers of what he denounces as dangerous drug frauds, and urges Congress to amend at this session the Pure Food and Drug law to strengthen that act in vital points of weakness recently pointed out by decisions of the United States Supreme Court. President Taft believes that unless the law is amended forth with the country will again be flooded by injurious nostrums and curealls which were common before the Pure Food law was enacted.

Senator Penrose chairman of the United States Senatorial Finance Committee speaking on Monday after a short interview with President Taft said: The Canadian Reciprocity bill is in a stronger position now than it ever has been despite recent happenings in the Senate. The bill will go through without an amendment and I believe Congress will adjourn about Aug. 1.

An amendment by Senator Root proposing a modification of the wood pulp and print paper section of the agreement was defeated by an overwhelming vote.

Princess Clothilde widow of

Prince Napo'leon Bonaparte ('Plon-Plon'), died near Turin on Sunday, aged sixty-eight. She was the daughter of Victor Emmanuel, first King of Italy.

In 1859 she was married to Prince Napo'leon. It was purely a political alliance and Princess Clothilde who was a most pious woman more fitted for a convent than such a court as that of the third Napoleon did not live a happy married life. She had three children Prince Napoleon, now the head of the Bonaparte family, who recently married Clementine, daughter of the late Leopold King of the Belgians; Prince Napoleon Louis who served many years in the Russian army and Laetitia, who married her mother's brother, Amadeus Duke of Aosta, for a short time King of Spain.

Mr J Pierpont Morgan of New York has presented Emperor William with the autograph letter written by Martin Luther to Emperor Charles V. and for which Mr. Morgan recently paid \$25,500. The Kaiser was immensely pleased, and forthwith conferred the Grand Cross of the Order of the Red Eagle on the donor.

A large irrigating reservoir burst on Monday near Grand Junction, Colorado, causing a property damage of about \$100,000. Five thousand cattle were drowned and several bridges were swept away. No lives were lost. Along the path of the flood for fifteen miles crops were washed out.

Iquique, a seaport of Chili and having a population of 50,000, was visited by a cyclone on June 23 which did much damage to buildings and shipping, many persons being also injured.

McGill University has decided to hold a reunion of all graduates in 1913. Although Lord Strathcona has provided \$450,000 for the erection of the new medical building and an additional \$100,000 toward its equipment, more money is needed, and it will require about \$1,000,000 to place the medical faculty upon an absolute sustaining basis, and to provide for increased salaries and staff extensions.

In a violent storm one of the four balloons starting in a race from Paris was blown over the North Sea. Only an empty ballast bag has been found. 'Parseval V,' the Zeppelin dirigible, which recently made a perilous landing at Halberstadt, Germany, was completely destroyed by fire while undergoing repairs. The new Zeppelin dirigible 'Schwaben I,' made a successful maiden flight at Friedrichshafen. Prof. Pacinotti of Pisa, has inven-

ed a conical pneumatic buffer to break the force of falling in aeroplanes. The contrivance is intended to be attached to the bottom of the machine. With a hydro aeroplane Glen Curtis gave a remarkable exhibition on land and water at Fall River, Mass., at one time attaining a speed of eighty miles an hour.

The strike of seamen and dockmen which seriously inconvenienced many of the shipping lines, is becoming very grave, many ships being now unable to leave port, to the great inconvenience of passengers and shippers.

FAVORS ADVERTISING.

I once heard an advertising man say the times for a merchant to advertise, were, first, when business was good, and second, when it was bad. Laid a real estate dealer yesterday, and the advertising man added that the time when he should spend the most money for advertising was when business was poorest.

That made a deep impression on me, and I have adopted it in my business, coupled with one other rule. That is, look prosperous, even if you are not. Only the rich man can afford to look poor. These two rules followed logically, will do for any one what they did for me, and for me they filled my flats and kept them full.

Several years ago I bought a row of sixty four story double apartment houses on one of the better streets. Opposite is a similar row of six, built at the same time five years ago, from the same plans. In the three years I have had my apartments I have lost less than 3 per cent of my rent through idle apartments. The owner of the house opposite told me he has lost nearly 30 per cent and I can believe him. He asked me to explain my luck and I told him my rule. He shook his head and said it was simple luck.

Following my rule to look prosperous I never put a 'let sign' in a window. As soon as an apartment is empty I have it cleaned and put into condition. Then I hang lace curtains in the windows which I have cleaned once a week. No one would know the place was not occupied. Outside the Janitor's office there is a little gold sign that tells of apartments to rent and seekers come there first.

Many a time I have seen people look up at my neighbor's property across the street, shake their heads at its many vacancies, which they take to indicate something intrinsically wrong, and come to me. The chances are I have nothing to offer, for I often have a list of persons waiting to get in, but if I have a place I am sure of getting it filled at once. With one exception, and that was due to accident. I have never lost more than one month's rent in a year on any one apartment. Most of my tenants stay three or four.

Besides looking prosperous I advertise as soon as I hear that a tenant is to go, and often have a new one to go in as soon as the place is ready. Anyone can do it; or if he can't it is because his rents are too high or something else is wrong with the property. —Minneapolis Journal.

TEA LOST TO THE AMERICAN MARKET.

Shanghai, July, 5.—Deadlock in the green tea business, caused by America's prohibition of the importation of colored teas, continues and threatens to deprive the American markets of this year's supply.

The tea is unquestionably much purer than ever before, and the Chinese have made great efforts to meet the wishes of Americans, but the buyers decline to purchase unless the Chinese guarantee that the tea is new colored.

This the Chinese decline to do, on the ground that the samples of new teas sent to the American authorities in June should be accepted as evidence.

The stopping of adulteration, they contend, causing manufacturers to abstain from the century old custom of coloration, will require time. Meanwhile America should modify the enforcement of the act for this season on the promise of the guarantee furnished for next year's teas.

Unless this is done there is little hope that the fifteen million pounds of green tea ordinarily sent to America will be shipped.
