The following is copied from the Maritime Baptist.

Alexander P. F. I. Just a few words from this field to let our pastors who are looking for churches know our need. This field lies just across the river from Charlottetown, and is composed of three churches, viz., Hazelbrook, Alexander and Cross road. The last mentioned is a Christian church, which has united with us to support a pastor. The preaching places are situated at the angles of a triangle, the sides of which are each three miles long. Our parsonage is at Hazelbrook within two hundred yards of R. R. Sta. Our last pastor was Rev. H. S. Erb. (now of Meductic, N. B.) who did grand work baptizing over thirty converts while here, and was greatly beloved by his people. Gladly would we have had him remain with us, but circumstances over which neither pastor nor people had control prevented this. The preaching is heavy on our field, three sermons each Sunday, and there being a good deal going back and forward necessitates at least two new sermons each week. We hope to be able to pay \$700 and a parsonage per year, and perhaps as good as \$50. more in useful things would be brought into the parsonage. We pray that the Lord may direct to us the right man, who will get a hearty reception from our people.
