At the last games Canadians came away with a good share of the prizes, but we fell down on some mighty important events. For instance Walker of South Africa, took the 100 meter (109.3 yards). Could you go better than 10 4-5 seconds, the winner's time? Could you train up to that?

**ENGLISH WEIGHT SCALE BAD FOR AMERICANS.**

A proposal has been made by certain Gotham sportsmen to have the New York State athletic commission adopt a review scale of weights which would raise the scaling marks for all classes to conform with those set forth by the National sporting club of London. They tried this game in the east on several occasions, but other selections of the country in which boxing flourished failed to respond with enthusiasm and the scheme fell through.

The English system is to weigh in at 2 o'clock and weights are as follows: Bantam limit, 118; feather, 126; light, 135; welter, 143; middleweight, 160. Imagine Johnny Coulon being obliged to scale 118 at 2 o'clock, when he can go lighter than 115 pounds ringside if necessary. Abe Attell goes out of his class frequently to meet lightweights in 10-round bouts, but when his title is in question he holds strictly to the 122-ringside limit, as was evidenced when he recently refused to meet Jose Rivers unless the Mexican made that figure.

Wolcast can do 128 at 3 o'clock if needful. If the proposed new ruling be adopted he would find himself pitted again men who would enter the ring weighing easily 140 pounds. There are scores of youngsters fighting their way up the ladder who would be handicapped in like fashion.

**Joins the Irish-Americans**

Le Roy Dorland, former captain of the Pastime Athletic Club, and holder of the 200-yard indoor record, has been expelled from the club at which he developed into one of America's greatest runners and hurdlers.

For several months Dorland had not been in good standing in his club. Several times he asked for his release, only to be refused, and piqued by this he competed unattached. This earned the wrath of the officials of the club, and they preferred charges against him, with the result that when the meeting was held every one present but Harry Smith, the captain of the club, voted to expel him. Smith was present, but refused to vote. Dorland took his expulsion gracefully. In fact he seemed pleased.

Dorland has been in the athletic game for five years. He has won many titles. Besides the Pastime A. C. he was a member of the Seventy-first Regiment. Before developing into a champion both the New York A. C. and the Irish-American A. C. tried to get him for their club. Each time he refused. He is now a member of the latter club.

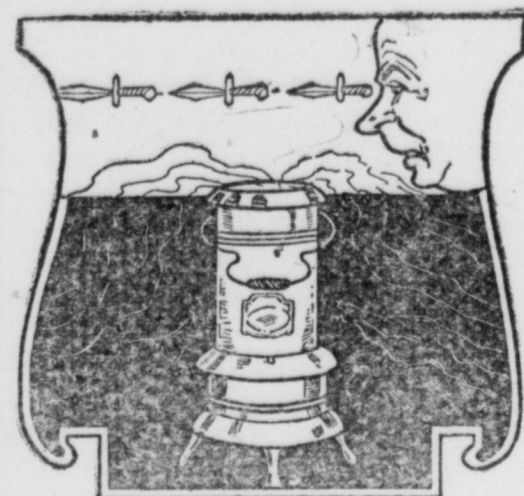
