BAPTISTS AND FREE BAPTISTS
IN STATES UNITE MISSION
WORK

Ocean Park, N. Y., July 19—The conference board of the Free Baptist church of America, composed of 21 members, after an earnest discussion, has voted unanimously to merge the foreign and home missionary interests of the Baptist and Free Baptist denominations.

The board authorized the executive to make the transfer before October 1st. After that date the missionary interests of the two denominations will be managed by one set of officers.

Between now and October 1st the executive committees of the two denominations will get together and make all the necessary arrangements for the union. A set of officers will be elected and the interests of both denominations safeguarded.

It has long been the belief of the Baptist and Free Baptist leaders that it would prove beneficial to both churches to operate the missionary branches under one head. The matter of co-operation was discussed last summer by the Free Baptists at Ocean Park, and at meetings held during the winter.

While the co-operation of foreign and home missionary interests will go into effect October 1st it is believed that organic union of the Baptist and Free Baptist churches is a long distance away.

SUMMER SCHOOL OF SCIENCE

A Large Enrollment of Students.

From present indications it appears that the 1911 session of this school, when opened in Fredericton on Wednesday July 12, will have a record attendance. One feature

which has doubtless attracted a large number of teachers is the offer of Money Scholarships which have been donated by friends of the school and others interested in education.

About fifty Scholarships will be awarded; some of ten dollars each and some of twenty dollars. A few Scholarships are given for teachers from certain districts, but the majority are open for competition amongst all the students.

The Board of Education has granted the use of the Provincial Normal school for the meetings of the Summer School, and over flow classes will be accommodated in the City High School.

In addition to the classes and lectures, field work and excursions will be indulged in.

The Senate of the University of New Brunswick will also tender the students a Garden Party in the beautiful grounds of the College.

HIGH PRICES FOR NO MARK
LOGS

The annual sale of no mark and mixed logs rafted and to be rafted by the St John River Log Driving Company was held this morning at eleven o'clock in the Board of Trade rooms. Ald Potts was the auctioneer, and a dozen lumbermen were present.

The sales were made as follows:

Hemlock, 17,440 feet no mark, 25,000 feet mixed marks—York-Sunbury Lumber Co, at \$7.50.

Hardwood, 6,977 feet—Warner & Co, at \$6.

Cedar, 79,640 feet no mark, 14,190 mixed marks—Stetson, Cutler & Co, at \$9.40.

Pine, 8,560 feet no mark, 11,680 mixed marks—Hilyard Bros, at \$10.25.

Spruce, 231,803 feet merchantable, 281,148 battens, 101,008 condemned, no mark, 44,342 merchantable, 106,308 battens, 4,962 condemned, mixed marks—Partington Pulp and Paper Co, Ltd, at \$14.50 for merchantable, two-thirds price for battens, no charge for condemned.

The above quantities represent the lumber already rafted, and the purchasers will take the additional quantities to be rafted during the balance of the season. The prices paid are unusually high.

After the auction a meeting of the directors of the St. John Log Driving Company was held.

VALUABLE TIMBER LANDS
DESTROYED

Amherst, N S, July 17—A terrible forest fire has been raging in the western portion of this county for the last week. The fire originated on the lumber property owned by Messrs Cochrane & Solry at Fox River. These gentlemen claim that the fire was plainly the work of an incendiary and that fires were set in three distinct places on their property and on portions of it not visited by hunters or fishermen. From Fox River settlement the fire has sprung to adjoining lumber lands owned by Messrs C T White and Son, Apple River; Messrs Robinson and Wright, Shulee; Messrs Kelly Bros, River Hebert, and the property of Mr. H. Elderkin, in the same section of the county. So far the fire has run through valuable lumber lands, for a distance of eighteen miles, and has burned a swath from six to eight miles wide. From one to two hundred men employed by the different lumbermen in this section of the county, have been vigorously fighting the fire for the past six or eight days with but little success. To-day the conflagration is raging as fiercely as ever, and clouds of smoke overhang all the villages along the Bay of Fundy coast, and up through the River Hebert valley. Messrs Robinson and Wright have a cut of two million feet of lumber which is seriously threatened, the flames now being within two miles of their

mills. The fire is travelling towards this property. It is impossible as yet, to give any estimate with regard to the loss, but there is no doubt that millions of feet of valuable lumber has been destroyed. So far as can be learned, no houses or buildings have yet become a prey to the flames, but several settlements have had close calls. If rain does not come to relieve the situation, it looks as if the fire would continue until it had burned itself out. Without doubt it is one of the most disastrous fires that has ever visited this part of the province. The loss to the operators will be exceedingly heavy.

Steamer Mikado, Capt Lewis, arrived to-day from Alma. In speaking of the forest fires Capt Lewis said that when he left Alma at one o'clock this morning, the fire was reported within fourteen miles of the settlement of Apple River. All the men of Messrs C T White and Company, as well as the men in Mr Robinson's employ, have been sent into the forests to fight the fire. All work of loading vessels is stopped, and the men sent to try and stop the fire. Water is being hauled by teams, and earth dug up in places in an effort to check the spread of the fire toward the settlement.
