London, Nov. 28—Following his resignation of the leadership of the Unionist party, Mr. A. J. Balfour, it is reported here, contemplates an extended visit to Canada in search of health.

At the same time he will personally inspect the large property which he has acquired in the Dominion.

After disposing of his Scottish estates, Mr. Balfour invested most of the proceeds in real estate in Canada. Not long ago some of his property was destroyed in a fire in Winnipeg.

Mr. Balfour, who is a bachelor, is said to have an annual income of a quarter of a million dollars.

Boston, Mass., Nov. 22—Puzzled by the sudden appearance of a dozen miles of beds of scallops on the shores of Cape Cod, fishermen have asked the state fish commission to investigate.

The experts will try to determine why the scallops this season are so much larger than formerly and whether or not they are of a new species, or of a variety which hitherto has inhabited only the deeper waters of the coast.

Smuggling of Contract Laborers is Discovered

Niagara Falls, Ont., Nov. 30—After being fined fifty dollars for assisting Daniel Rocco, John Sticki, Jack Diqua, Mike Bores and Nector Koebe of Buffalo, to enter Canada illegally, Joseph Poutage, a Russian, told Magistrate Fraser today that he had been smuggled into Canada to work for a contractor at Welland. He declared many foreigners were being brought in as he was. The authorities will investigate.

Conductors Want Right To Strike

OTTAWA, Nov. 30.—An amendment of the Lemieux Act is being asked for by the Canadian Railway Conductors. They object to the provision which forbids them to strike before a dispute is investigated by a conciliation board. The conductors claim that this puts them at a serious disadvantage. The legislation is being promoted by a delegation from the conductors' organization.

Evidence Of A Wreck

SAULT STE. MARIE, Mich., Nov. 30.—That some vessel was lost in the fierce storm of Tuesday, on Lake Superior, is the theory of marine men here from the reports of wreckage of over a million feet of pine. The steamers Wilhelm and Muller arrived last night and reported passing through large quantities of short timber. Some think the unfortunate steamer is the Jay Gould, which is said to have had a cargo of short lumber and has not yet been reported. If reports are confirmed, it will add another to the long list which has found a resting place in that section known as "The Graveyard" of the lakes, for in the neighborhood of White Fish and Vermillion more boats have been lost than at any other place on the lakes.

Lake Steamer Wrecked; Man and Wife Drowned

Buffalo, N. Y., Nov. 30—The steamer Baleight, Captain Beauvais, of Cleveland, Ohio, was blown on the rocks six miles west of Port Colborne today, is reported to be rapidly going to pieces.

Two members of the crew, Mr. and Mrs. Wise, the latter the steamer's cook, were drowned and William Pritchard, the engineer, is still on board the wreck. All are from Cleveland.

Nine members of the crew of twelve succeeded in getting ashore and were cared for in the huts at the Empire limestone quarries near Sherston.

Estimates Voted

Ottawa, Nov. 30—The whole of the estimates for the current year will likely be voted to-day or to-morrow. The Liberal opposition feels that it has done enough criticizing recently to last for a few days, and as the estimates were practically prepared last session by the Laurier Government, they are hardly in a position to condemn them. Though the items total a good many millions, they are rather beyond criticism, now as they were created by one party and adopted by the other. Besides five-twelfths of each of them have already been voted.

It is expected that the Christmas holiday adjournment of the House will commence on Dec. 16 and will last until after New Year's.

Capt. William H. Miller

Deceased Engaged in River Navigation for 57 Years

Many relatives and friends were greatly pained to learn of the sudden death of Capt. William H. Miller, which occurred at the City hospital last Saturday evening. Capt Miller had been in poor health for some time, but had only been confined to his bed about two weeks. He was born in New Brunswick March 20, 1830, and for the past 57 years he had been engaged in river navigation. During the first 26 years he was master and pilot on the St. John river in New Brunswick, and for the past 31 years he had been the well known pilot on the several different steamers that have plied between Haverhill and Black Rocks on the Merrimack river. During those years Capt. Miller had made many friends and his kind and courteous manner endeared him to all who came in contact with him. He was married in Woodstock, N. B., July 8, 1874, to Miss Margaret Cumming of Aberdeen, Scot, who survives him, and to them were born eight children, all of whom are living, they being Mrs. Charles N. Brackett of Dexter, Me.; Capt. Gilbert M. Miller, Harry W. Miller, Alex. C. Miller and Earle J. Miller, all of this city; Frank L. Miller of Spokane, Wash.; Fred O. Miller and George W. Miller of Boston, Mass. Beside these there are one brother, James Miller of Woodstock, N. B.; six grandchildren and several nephews and nieces left to mourn their loss.

The funeral was held from his late home, 43 Adams street, Tuesday afternoon, the services being conducted by Rev. J. L. Hoyle, pastor of the Riverside Memorial church, who spoke comforting words to a large circle of sorrowing relatives and friends. Interment was in the family lot at Elmwood cemetery.

When Holland River is reached the canal will then be opened to a body of water on the same level as Lake Simcoe. The Newmarket Canal was undertaken by the late Laurier Government and up to date has cost over a million dollars.
