## Brown Tail Moths Found in York Co.

The Brown Tail Moth, the dreaded Pest which has destroyed hundreds of thousands of dollars worth of trees in the New England States, has invaded York County

The Provincial Agricultural Department in this city has been notified that a nest of the Brown Tail Moths has been found on a plum-tree in the orchard of Mr. William Palmer, one of the best known farmer in the Scotch Lake district.

The discovery was made by Mr. W. H. Moore, also of Scotch Lake, a well known amateur naturalists, who has on various occasions lectured before the Fredericton Natural History Society on the subject of birds, and who was for some time a director of Agricultural Society No. 34, which biennially conducts the Fredericton Exhibitions.

A corps of experts are now engaged in hunting Brown Tail Moth nests in this province and destroying the pests. There are four men in the party, two being employed by the Dominion Government and two by the Provincial Government. They have already discovered three hundred and fifty nests and have recently moved the scene of their operations from near St. Stephen to grand Manan.

They will be engaged in their work on the Islands on the New Brunswick coast until early in the New Year when they will come to Fredericton and proceed with their work in this vicinity. The New England states in recent years have made large expenditures in fighting this dreaded pest and the farmers and people generally are glad to see the Provincial Government taking action.

## Dismissal at Ottawa

Ottawa, Dec. 15.—One hundred men, artisans in the Dominion Public Works Department, Ottawa, will be discharged by the government to-day. Four masons, six plumbers, three carpenters and five painters are on the list, the rest being laborers temporarily employed since just before September 21st. A foreman and assistant foreman are also slated to go, all for partisanship in the recent election.

## Seven to State Prison

With seven convicted men in charge, four of them having reputations as tough characters, Sheriff E. G. Bryson, of Aroostook county, and Deputy Sheriff Henry D. Smart passed through Bangor Tuesday of last week on their way to the State prison at Thomaston. The prisoners and their sentences are as follows: Herbert Chase, rape, six years; Joe Michurd, larceny, three years; Charles Friel, murder, life; Joe L'evore, rape, four years; Oscar Pelkey, larceny, three years; Cleveland Harvey, forgery, three years; Fred Bell, larceny, two years.

## Missionaries are in Grave Danger

Amoy, China, Dec. 15.—Extreme anti-foreign feeling prevails at the present moment at Chang Su, where the the English and Roman Catholic Mission buildings were burned in February, 1906 by a Boxer mob. A large number of placards threatening foreigners have been posted all over the town.

Yuan Hung Kwach, the military governor of Southern Fo Kien has sent a request to the foreign consuls asking them to recall all missionaries in the province to Amoy. The authorities say that they cannot assume responsibility for the lives of these missionaries in the interior.

## Duke and Duchess Attend St. Andrew's Ball at Montreal

Montreal, Dec. 14.—The Duke and Duchess of Connaught tonight attended St. Andrew's ball, the greatest social event in Montreal's social calendar. This afternoon they visited the Grey Nunnery Convent, where addresses were delivered in English and French by small pupils, who had evidently been carefully drilled by the nuns.

## Five American Soldiers Charged With Dynamiting

Junction City, Kan., Dec. 14.—Five privates of E. battery, sixth field artillery, were arrested at Fort Riley this afternoon for connection with recent dynamite explosions at the fort which entailed property losses of half a million dollars to the government.

## Treaty To Protect Seals Ratified

Washington, Dec. 12.—Ratifications were exchanged here today by Great Britain, Russia Japan and the United States of the treaty for the protection of seals in the North Pacific and Behring Sea.

Under this treaty pelagic sealing will be terminated and the taking of fur seals will be regulated by the four governments. Congress will have to appropriate \$200,000 to compensate Japanese and Canadian sealers for the abandonment of sealing.

## Another Baby in Spain's Royal Family

Madrid, Dec. 12.—Queen Victoria of Spain gave birth to a daughter this morning. This is the fifth child born to Queen Victoria, the fourth being still-born. King Alfonso and Victoria Ena, Princess of Battenberg, were married May 31, 1906. Their first child, Prince Alfonso, was born May 10, 1907. The other children are Prince Jamie and Princess Beatrice.
