**HOUSEHOLD HINTS**

**A Good Idea to Keep Lime in the Pantry**

Flour absorbs all odors, so keep it closely covered.

A Small Box of Lime kept in the pantry will help to make the air quite dry and pure. It should be renewed occasionally.

Before putting Milk into the saucepan, boil rapidly a few spoonfuls of water (enough to just cover the bottom of the pan) and it will never burn, however fierce the fire.

Where there are several children constantly in need of new shoes, the one who has to provide them will do well to try this: Cover soles of shoes with three or four coats of copal varnish, and they will never need re-sooling.

The Really Best Method of cleaning mirrors and windows is to rub them with a paste of whiting and water. When this dries polish with dry camels and remove the powder. A little alcohol in cold water also gives a brilliant polish. Soapsuds should never be used.

It is not generally known that slices of lemon put into the copper when boiling clothes will make them beautifully white and take all the stains out of pocket-handkerchiefs and children's aprons. Cut the lemon, with the rind, into slices, and let it remain in the boiler till the clothes are ready to come out.

In Spite of all the remedies offered for driving away ants from the house, the only sure way seems to be to catch and kill them. Set in the closets plates coated thick with soft lard, with little sticks leaning against them for the ants to climb. When filled, drop into a pan of boiling water, and then set the plate as before.

To remove Grease or oil spots from clothing, especially light suits as worn by cyclists and tourists, mix a little fuller's earth into a paste, spread it over the affected part and allow the same to dry thoroughly. In doing so it draws and absorbs the grease. Then take a stiff brush, which will quickly remove the dried earth, and the result will be pleasing, and far more satisfactory than most other methods.

Painted Wood, panellings, and wainscoting can be rapidly and effectually cleaned with potato-water. Put half a dozen tubers into a pail, having previously peeled, washed and grated them. Pour a gallon or two of fresh water over them and let them stand for half an hour; then strain and use with a house flannel. No scrubbing will be needed, but another flannel with clean water must be used for rinsing purposes. This is good for any kind of wood.

**A BEAUTY HINT**

If you want to make your face look thinner, arrange the hair loosely, but not allowing it to flop forward. This is much better than straining it back. Do not cover the head with curls, as this only increases the size. A neat, close arrangement of the hair at the back is better.

**A DRESS HINT**

Always have some arrangement on your dress to give length by a downward line. For instance, if you make yourself one of the little seamless blouses, have a piece of perpendicular embroidery let into the front, or slit the blouse a little on one side and insert one of those pretty white muslin frills. Never have a blouse and skirt of different colors. This is a most important rule if you want to look slimmer. Blouse, skirt and waistbelt should always be the same shade.

**FIGHTING THE FLIES**

How to Minimize the Nuisance These Pests Cause

A recent issue of The Woman's World gives a list of rules for dealing with the nuisance that it would be well if all householders would read, use, and remember. The list is as follows:

Keep the flies away from the sick, especially those ill with contagious diseases. Kill every fly that strays into the sick-room. His body is covered with disease germs.

Do not allow decaying material of any sort to accumulate on or near your premises.

All refuse which tends in any way to fermentation, such as bedding straw, paper waste and vegetable matter, should be disposed of or covered with lime or kerosene oil.

Screen all food.

Keep all receptacles for garbage carefully covered and the cans cleaned or sprinkled with oil or lime.

Keep all stable manure in vault or pit, screened or sprinkled with lime, oil, or other cheap preparation.

See that your sewage system is in good order, that it does not leak, is up to date, and not exposed to flies.

Pour kerosene into the drains. Cover food after a meal, burn or bury all table refuse.

Screen all food exposed for sale. Screen all windows and doors, especially the kitchen and dining-room.

Burn pyrethrum powder in the house to kill the flies.

Don't forget, if you see flies, their breeding place is nearby filth. It may be behind the door, under the table or in the cuspidor.

If there is no dirt and filth there will be no flies.

If there is a nuisance in the neighborhood, write at once to the health department.

It is far better that the beauty of the carpet should fade than that your face should bear the marks of a sympathetic wear and tear. You can easily buy a new carpet when one of your good husband's numerous ships comes in in the near future, but you cannot buy a new face.

**TO CLEAN GILT**

The following method is excellent for cleaning discolored gilt or brass ornaments. Dissolve a piece of soft soap about the size of an egg in a pint of hot water, and add a tablespoonful of ammonia. Carefully wash with a cloth wrung out of this mixture, rinse with cold water, and dry with a soft cloth. You will find that the stains will disappear like magic.

**TO WASH BLANKETS**

When washing blankets for the first time, we always steep them over night in cold water in which a handful of borax has been dissolved. They are much easier to wash when treated in this way than if put straight into suds.

**CLEANING TUMBLERS**

Tumblers which have been used for milk should always be rinsed in cold water before they are washed in hot. When this is done the milk does not stick to the glass, and there is no danger of their looking cloudy.

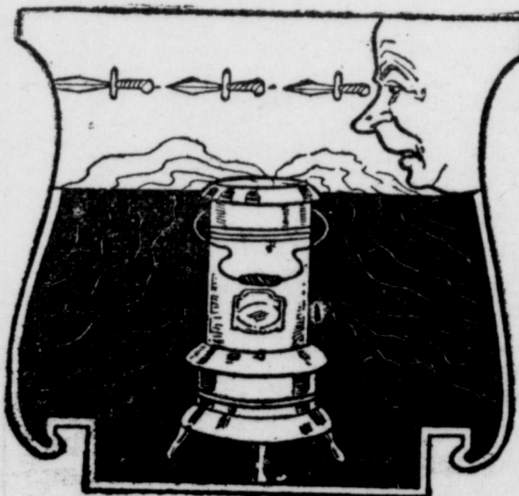
