In California, where the first successes were achieved in the use of oil for road making, this material has been found to be invaluable for protecting the sand levees of that State from the action of water and wind. Levees are extensively resorted to for the protection of the land in many of the valleys from flooding at the time of the spring thaws, but heretofore it has been necessary to work constantly upon these dykes, as the wind and water quickly reduce them to the level. A spray ing of oil is said to give them permanence, so that very little attention is required after the work is once done. The oil is applied from a jet and it sinks into the sand for a depth of six inches making a coating which resists both the wind and the water.
