## Oil Resists Wind And Water

The United States government has for many years been experimenting with various suggestions made to save certain parts of the seashore from erosion by the action of waves, and the most satisfactory has been that of planting grasses; but this is expensive and requires considerable time and work before the grass becomes satisfactorily established. In California, where the first successes were achieved in the use of oil for road making, this material has been found to be invaluable for protecting the sand levees of that State from the action of water and wind. Levees are extensively resorted to for the protection of the land in many of the valleys from flooding at the time of the spring thaws, but heretofore it has been necessary to work constantly upon these dykes, as the wind and water quickly reduce them to the level. A spraying of oil is said to give them permanence, so that very little attention is required after the work is once done. The oil is applied from a jet and it sinks into the sand for a depth of six inches making a coating which resists both the wind and the water.

Rome, Aug. 7.—Queen Maria Pia of Portugal who died recently at Turin, was widely known among European royal as a woman of ridiculous extravagance. Since her death several incidents have become known showing that she was responsible in a large measure for the great debt piled up by the house of Braganza at Lisbon, which had something to do with the murder of her son, King Carlo, and the despoisoning of her grandson King Manuel.

As the last man disappeared the old Queen turned to her widowed daughter-in-law with the remark:

"I suppose none of these good folk possess washing utensils by any chance."
