Farm Topics

Wagon Roads

Wagon roads are to the farm what the railroads are to the town and city. What would happen to a city if it had such railroads that they would have to charge two or three times as much for freight and passenger traffic as to some other city otherwise equally well situated; or the road bed so poor that only slow time could be made; or that the roads would be impassable during parts of the year? We know that no city could maintain itself under these conditions.

These are preposterous statements to make of a railroad; but they are the conditions that often maintain on country roads where the expense of hauling is, in many cases, two or three times what it should be, where the road is such that it takes two or three times as long to get to market as it should, where the roads are not in condition for hauling loads at all times. This works to the detriment of the farm and its industries just as much as that kind of railroad would work to the detriment of a town or city.—W. C. Palmer, North Dakota College.

Tethering Cows On Forage Crops

Everyone who is interested in dairy farming has heard of the successful Danish farmer. Like the Norman farmer he is a great hand at tethering his cows on forage crops and grass. There is no country in the world in which so much waste is incurred on the farm by fences as in our own. Where cows are turned out in other countries, they are usually enclosed by wire fences or tethered to the soil.

In this country, if forage crops are grown for summer use, they are cut and left for a day and then carted to the stalls, or strewn across the pastures. Where cows are tethered on green crops such as lucerne, rye, grass, clover or clover mixture, trees, trifolium and the like, they should be gradually accustomed to the food before they are allowed to eat their fill. It is a good plan to cut a portion for the first few days and allow it to wilt before feeding; it may then be given a little greener until the tether is fixed short enough to enable the cows to feed, but not to doil themselves with the luscious food, which might very easily gasb hoven.

Raspberry Twig Girdler

Raspberry Twig Girdler has been a familiar insect for a long time. The beetle, which is long and slender, with black wing covers and yellow thorax, is called the *Oberia bipunctata*. It lies a girdle around the twig six inches or so from the extremity, and then it turns around and bites another girdle at the distance of its own length from the first. Between the two it makes a little hole and inserts in it an egg; from this there soon hatches out a yellowish maggot, which bores down through the stem and feeds on the pith. The effect of the girdler is to cause an almost immediate wilting of the twig to that the injury is readily observed.

Like many other insects, it has its periods of abundance. Last year was a very favorable one for it, its attacks having been noticed in many widely scattered parts of Ontario.

A Useful Table

Twelve teaspoons of dry material equal one cup.
Two cups equal one pint.
Four cups of liquid equal one quart.
Four cups of flour equal one pound.
Two cups of butter equal one pound.
Two cups of sugar equal one pound.
Batter the size of an egg equals two ounces or one quarter cup.
Three teaspoons equal one tablespoon.
Sixteen tablespoons equal one cup.
Two tablespoons of butter equal one ounce.
This has been useful to one, and it may be to others.

FOOD VALUE OF CHEESE

Fresh Meat Has Little More Than Half its Nourishment

A comparison of the food value of cheese with that of other highly nitrogenous food materials may be of interesting value. No kind of meat excepting dried beef carries such a large percentage of protein as cheese, and as dried beef contains a much greater percentage of water, the other food constituents, apart from the protein, are much less than is found in cheese. Fresh beef as purchased has, weight for weight, little more than half the food value of cheese in either protein or fat, and the same is true of practically all other fresh meats, which have in many cases such a large percentage of water that they are noticeably inferior to cheese in food value. Bacon or pork fat are exceptions, but their food value is mostly in the fat, which can be and is replaced to a great extent by the carbohydrates of vegetables at a much less cost, and sometimes, perhaps, at a benefit to the health of the consumer. Fish and pork each have a notably large percentage of refuse, while eggs have a high percentage of water. To sum the matter up, a pound of cheese has nearly the same food value as two pounds of fresh beef, or any other fresh meat, as food; it is worth as much as or more than a pound of ham, and is more digestible, and it is equal to two pounds of eggs or three pounds of fish.

NOVEL PLACE OF WORSHIP

A Bishop Has Consecrated a Chapel on Wheels

A chapel on wheels has just been consecrated by Archbishop Bourne. This novel place of worship is to be sent on tour in charge of two priests, for whom it will also be a residence. It is an ordinary motor-van, the interior of which is fitted with a miniature altar for the celebration of Mass, with prie-Dieu kneelers for a dozen worshippers. When not in use for Divine services the benches are stowed away, the altar cleared of its ornaments, and the vehicle becomes a travelling van, with beds for the accommodation of the two priests. The chapel on wheels will start for East Anglia, and the first stopping-place is to be Haverhill, where Father Bernard Vaughan will deliver a series of lectures during a week's sojourn in that town.

SOMETHING LIKE A PLAGUE

An Advancing Horde of Locusts Resembles a Dark Cloud

A locust invasion is an event not easily forgotten. The first sign of the approaching army is usually a long, dark cloud on the horizon. As it comes nearer, it is seen to be composed of countless millions of locusts on whirring wings. Soon the cloud appears overhead, and is sufficiently thick to obscure the sun. Now we are in the midst of a dense swarm of flying, whirring locusts, which dash into our faces, enter our houses, and fill our rooms with their presence; the air is simply alive with them. All open wells must be instantly covered, or they will be polluted by the insects. Fowls and turkeys, however, welcome the advancing hordes; they simply fatten on the locusts. But their flesh becomes so tainted by this diet as to be quite unsaleable, and even their eggs have an unpleasant taste. As soon as locusts make their appearance in a locality, the price of eggs drops to one-half or one-third of their former value. Pigs also feed on locusts, and their flesh also becomes affected; in fact, all animals seem to be adversely affected, for horses have a strong aversion to grass which has been polluted by locusts, and, unless very hungry, will not touch it.—Answers.
