The Verification Certificate will, if presented on or before November 30th, 1911, and on payment of the Returning Rate as shown above, entitle purchaser to Second-Class Ticket good to return from Moose Jaw, Saskatoon, or any Station East thereof in territory above stated to original starting point, by same route as travelled on going journey. From Stations West of Moose Jaw and Saskatoon, in territory above stated, Tickets will be issued to original starting point on payment of One Cent per Mile to Moose Jaw or Saskatoon, plus Farm Laborers rate from such point to Eastern destination, provided holder has deposited Certificate with Ticket Agent on arrival at Western destination and worked at least thirty days as a Farm Laborer. Fire At Ottawa

At Ottawa, Wednesday night, a fire, with losses estimated at \$100,000, was caused by two boys smoking cigarettes. The warehouse of Provost & Alward, wholesale grocers, was damaged to the extent of \$20,000. The flames then caught Chevrier's Hotel which was completely gutted.

A large paper mill merger is reported in process of formation. The following concerns are mentioned as going into the project: The Montrose Paper Company, Thorold; Kinloch Paper Company, St. Catharines; Barber Brother's Company, Georgetown; Toronto Paper Company, Cornwall; St. Lawrence Paper Company, Milleroches; Rolland Paper Company, Montreal, and Northern Paper Company, Quebec. All the coated paper factories are to be included in the merger, and the capital is to be \$5,000,000.

FIRE IN LIMESTONE.

Eugene B. Temple Monday morning lost his valuable set of farm buildings on the Van Buren road some two miles north of Limestone village. The fire started from a defective flue in the wash room. The garage and potato-house were the only buildings saved, but the automobile, with which Mr. Temple had just been making a trip, was in the barn and hence was burned. The loss is about \$14,000, insurance \$3,000. This must be classed as one of the severe farm-building fires.

Boiler Burst, Killed Boy

**Charles Devoe, Aged 11 Years,
Killed at Merry Go Round**

Charles Devoe of Caribou, aged 11 years, was killed about 11:00 o'clock August 17 at the Catholic picnic at the Fort Fairfield trotting-park by the bursting of the steam boiler that was used to run George Wiley's merry-go-round. Charles St Pierre of Van Buren, the fireman, was also seriously injured, and Mr. Wiley bruised and scratched somewhat. G. W. Eastman and a few others were standing so near that they were covered with flying gravel.

The boiler belonged to Charles A. Perry of Limestone, and was apparently quite rusty. The force of the explosion was such that it carried most of the boiler and big wagon on which it was sitting clear over the merry-go-round tent, breaking off the extreme top of the tent's centre pole, and striking on the ground ten feet the other side, pinning young Devoe to the ground by his head and neck under a large grate, and crushing him horribly. The grate was once taken to Under-the-hill, and the heart beat for nearly 30 minutes after the accident. The boy was the son of Stephen Devoe of Caribou. His mother is a sister to Allen Drost of Fort Fairfield, at which place the boy for some time had been living. Had the merry-go-round through the tent, on to the ground around itself, which was then a dozen feet high, it might easily have killed a dozen.

**Bridge at Van Buren Has
Been Completed**

Van Buren, Aug. 18—The International bridge between this town and St. Leonards, N.B. has been completed and the commissioners were expected to come here and inspect it Friday or Saturday. If accepted the bridge will be opened for public use at once.

The construction of the bridge, which cost \$85,000 was begun last September. It is 757 feet long with a roadway 22 feet wide and a sidewalk eight feet wide. On iron plates at either end of the bridge is the following inscription:

"International bridge St. Leonards N. B., Van Buren, Maine. 1911. Department Public Works, Canada, S. J. Chaplin, commissioner. Department Highways, Maine. P. D. Sargent commissioner, Engineer, E. E. Greenwood."
