Has Been Averted

Germany and France Settle Disputed Points

Paris Talks Conference

London, Aug.4-The Standard claims to have good authority for the statement that all danger of a war over Morocco has vanished. The disputed points be tween Germany and France, the news paper says, have been settled in principle but the details still remain to be negotiat ed. France will concede to Germany ter ritory in the French Congo in return for a free hand in Morocco and thus there is no fear of Germany permanently occupy ing forts in Moroccc.

Some time will be consumed disposing of these details. The nature of the settle ment could not be learned except that it involves a considerable trading of colon al possessions and so transfers the centie of interest from the foreign to the coloni al office. It is understood that Russia played the part of the mutual friend and interposed in London and Paris, to take the rough edges off the English attitude. The challenging tone of which for a time was more threatening to peace than the actual subject of the negotiations.

Paris, Aug 4-With a significant unanimity, the French press favors the idea of submitting the Moroccan question to another European conference As Ger many is believed to be adverse to again appealing to the powers, this sudden chor us seems to indicate that word has been given to demand that the present negotia tions be broken off and a conference sum moned in the hope of bringing pressure to bear on Germany in order to make her come to terms At the same time no doubt is expressed as regards a peaceable settlement of the crisis It is generally believed here that any danger of war that may have existed has been removed by Englands attitude.

London, Aug 4-According to the government organs, the cabinet has fin ally decided to send the Veto Bill to the House of Lords without creating any new peers, trusting that the Liberal peers will he able to outvote the followers of Lord Halsbury, who are against the mea sure. The newspapers say there is some risk in this, as the government majority will probably be under ten, but if the bill is defeated by the Lords Premier As quith intends to proceed immediately to the creation of five Lundred new peers

The port of London authorities have decided to commence the construction of of a new deep water dock on the Thames early in 1912 Its cost is estimated at \$10,750,000 and the work will occupy a period of five years

An arbitrator has been appointed in the dock workers strike and there are strong hopes that the troubles with the workers and employers will be settled


