## RESUME RAFTING AT MITCHELL BOOM THIS AFTERNOON

Rafting work is being resumed by the St. John River Log Driving Company after a let-up of a few weeks.

Operations were started on Monday at the Mitchell boom below the city and the first joints of logs will be rafted this afternoon.

There is already about four or five million feet of logs in the lower boom and this week the forward end of the lower corporation drive will probably reach the head of the boom limits.

Due to the extremely warm weather the water in the river has been dropping rapidly and work has been delayed on the drive very much on that account. Under present conditions the work is going along very slowly.

The last two miles of the corporation limits before the boom limits are reached has been cleaned up by a sacking crew but from the foot of Little Bear Island down towards the head of the boom limits, the section on which the drive is now being carried on, is very hard driving at present and in some places logs will have to be twitched fully half a mile.—Gleaner.

## MISERY OF WORKERS

VIENNA, Aug. 4.—During the sitting of the Austrian Parliament thousands of handbills were thrown from the galleries. In these bills the government and the legislators were called upon to end the misery of those numerous families of workmen who for weeks have been forced to camp on the meadows outside Vienna because they cannot get lodgings, being unable to pay the excessive rents, or, having many children, are refused as tenants by the house owners.

Many workmen have committed suicide of late for this reason, while others have had to transfer their children to relatives and friends.

The condition of the working classes

will again become worse, as the new ministry has prohibited the further importation of Argentine meat, obeying the dictates of the agrarian parties here and in Hungary. This will cause a fresh rise in the price of meat.

## LABORERS STRIKE IN LONDON STILL ON.

London, Aug. 7.—The arbitrator chosen last week to effect a settlement between the employers and the striking dock laborers has given an award in favor of the men, but the dockers have declined not to resume work until the grievance of coal porters and lightermen are satisfied. These differences are expected to be compromised in a few days.

Unless a settlement of the strike is speedily effected a serious situation will result. A strike was called Saturday of 30,000 coalmen, coal porters and others, and thus the entire stoppage of London's transport trade is threatened. This would incidentally affect thousands of other workers and lead to a general cutting of food supplies.

## BLACK RUST IN WEST.

Winnipeg, Aug. 6.—Some black rust has appeared near Brandon. There is general drought throughout the province. There is no damage, but the situation is critical.

## A HUNDRED DROWNED IN NILE DISASTER

Alexandria Egypt Aug 8.—A boat over-crowded with natives who were on their way to attend a fair at Dessuk foundered in the Nile. Nearly one hundred persons were drowned. Thirty-six bodies have been recovered to-day.

## QUEBEC WILL SELL NO MORE WATER POWERS

Quebec, Aug. 8.—The provincial government has adopted a new policy as to water powers belonging to the crown. In future no such water power shall be definitely sold. Twenty years ago these water powers were allotted for nothing. Ten years ago much water power, like Shawingen and Grand Mere Falls, were sold for \$50,000. Now they shall not be sold at all, but rented by long leases of 99 years.

The minister of crown lands, Hon. Mr. Aillard, has just decided to offer at auction in September next ten water powers situated in different portions of the province.

## CRUSIER NIOBE OFF TO HALIFAX

Halifax, Aug 7.—The cruiser Niobe started on her tow to Halifax at 6 o'clock this evening, according to a wireless message from Clark's Harbor to Admiral Kingsmill. The weather was very thick, just as thick as it has been for a week, a heavy pall of fog resting on the entire western coast of Nova Scotia. It was decided however, that further delay would not be wise and that the trip of 140 miles to Halifax could be safely performed.

The flotilla of towing steamers, headed by H. M. S. Cornwall, waited till 6 o'clock so that they might start with the ebb tide. The naval authorities here expect that the tow will reach Halifax at noon tomorrow, thus making the journey at a rate of about eight miles an hour.

The Cornwall, which touched a rock at Green Island Bank at low water early Sunday afternoon, was but very slightly injured, indeed in the opinion of the naval people, her seaworthiness was not at all affected. There is some danger to her outer skin but so far as the authorities are aware she is making no water.

Captain Ley, of the Cornwall, has given no information regarding his mishap except that he touched and got off, and a brief statement of the extent of his damage, which has been cabled to the British admiralty. A despatch from Clark's Harbor tonight gives the following particulars of the Cornwall's accident:

"The Cornwall arrived off Cape Sable on Saturday and anchored close to the automatic buoy at the southwest ledges. On Sunday forenoon while attempting to steam around in the bay, without waiting for a pilot from the shore, the Cornwall struck on Green Island Bank, two miles from the anchorage of the Niobe. The launches from the Lady Laurier and the Niobe were hurried to the spot. During the afternoon the steamers Lady Laurier and Bridgewater pulled on the warship and about high tide brought the Cornwall back into deep water where she anchored.

## PORTUGAL.

Europe's latest republic is having a hard time, and there are predictions that it will not live long. The despatches in the last week have reported a number of disturbances, and have stated that the monarchist are actively prepared to make an effort to regain control. It is difficult however to obtain accurate information for the new government has a strict censorship of the telegraph and even letters are not safe. Lloyds Weekly London whose sympathies are with the new regime declares that the 'republic is having a hard struggle for existence. On all sides there is the cry, the monarchy was bad enough but this is worse. Indeed the republic is at a crisis in its affairs and revolt is spreading. Its adds that the government is faced with a dwindling revenue seriously increased expenditure and every prospect of a violent upheaval which it may not be able to resist. Commerce also is very hard hit, and the diminished Customs receipts and stagnation of business in the banks are sufficient proofs of the gravity of the position. It is further declared that in spite of the large sums obtained by the spoliation of Church property it is evident that the government is hard pressed for funds to maintain its existence and it is therefore sending a special agent to Paris and London to try to negotiate a loan. While these conditions exist prominent republicans are fighting over who shall be the President. This is not a bright outlook.—St John Globe.
