Boiestown Man Badly Wounded

Justin Clearwater, of Boiestown, accidentally shot himself near his home Thursday afternoon and is in a critical condition as a result.

He had been out in the woods on a hunting trip and was on his way home when the accident occurred. He had stopped after a long walk through the woods for a rest and hung his gun up on a branch of a tree while he sat on a log nearby.

Some way the gun fell and in doing so was discharged through the trigger catching on a twig of the tree. The bullet was a very large one, the rifle being of an old fashioned German design, entering his leg just back of the knee and tore the flesh off almost the entire calf of his leg.

The unfortunate man, knowing that he would probably bleed to death if the leg was not attended to as soon as possible, made great efforts to reach the nearest house. He could not walk on the injured leg at all and crawled all the way, the distance being over a mile, on one leg reaching the house in a completely exhausted condition.

Dr. Ryan, of Boiestown, was summoned immediately and found it necessary to put sixteen stitches in the wound. Mr. Clearwater was resting easily this morning and Dr. Ryan stated that he will in all probability save the man's leg unless blood poisoning sets in.

Blame Lieutenant For Niobe Wreck

Halifax, Nov. 15.—The first court martial in the history of His Majesty's Canadian navy concluded last evening when the court found Lieut. Lord Alister Graham guilty of negligence, or by default, stranding or suffering to be stranded H. M. C. S. Niobe. The court sentenced him to be reprimanded.

With all the impressiveness which characterizes what is perhaps the fairest court in the world, the ancient form

of trial was carried out. A court composed of the commanding officers of the ships of the cruiser squadron sat in judgment on their comrade, giving him that fair play which is one of the very corner stones of the British navy. None who have not witnessed a trial such as this, can fully realize what British fair-play means.
