Coal Strike Settled

Lethbridge, Alta., Nov. 16.—The definite statement is made that the coal strike officially ends November 20 at 7 a. m. The official return shows a total vote of 1,500, of which 900 are in favor of returning to work. Mine officials set November 20 for the date for ending a seven-months strike.

Conference About Valley Railway

Ottawa, Nov. 17.—Premier Fleming is to appear before the Dominion Cabinet tomorrow morning, when the final terms of the agreement respecting the St. John Valley Railway will be made public.

The conference was to have been held this afternoon, but went over at Premier Fleming's request. Mrs. Fleming is leaving this afternoon for home and the Premier expects to leave Ottawa tomorrow evening.

Premier Roblin of Manitoba and Attorney General Colin Campbell will present the demands of Manitoba for increased area and better financial terms to the government this evening.
