## DR. R. H. UPHAM.

The many friends of Dr. Robert H. Upham in Woodstock and vicinity will grieve to learn of his death, which occurred after a week's illness at his home, 199 Park street, West Roxbury district, Boston, Mass., on June 26. He had undergone an operation for appendicitis, from which he was unable to rally.

Dr. Upham was born in Woodstock on Oct. 25, 1847, the son of the late Thomas C. and Elizabeth (Hay) Upham.

In early life he was a moulder, having learned the trade in the foundry of his uncle, the late R. A. Hay. In 1865 he went to Portland, Me., and for several years worked at his trade in that city and at Lawrence, Mass. In 1877 he went to Boston and took up the study of dentistry. In this profession he was very successful, gaining an extensive practice and enjoying the respect and confidence of a large circle of friends.

The doctor was the principal organizer and first president of the Canadian Club of Boston, and manifested a lively interest in everything pertaining to the progress and welfare of the Dominion. He was also a member of the Masonic fraternity and of the Ancient and Honorable Artillery Company. With the latter organization he visited England in 1896.

He leaves a widow, two sons, a daughter and a brother to mourn his loss.

The funeral took place on June 29 service being held at the First Parish church, West Roxbury and was largely attended. The interment was at Billerica, Mass.
