**FRENCH SUBMARINE IS 18 HOURS  
UNDER WATER**

Officers and Crew Not Affected by Record  
Breaking Submergence Test in Toulon Har-  
bor.

PARIS, June 17.—The submarine Argon-  
aute has made a new world record by re-  
maining submerged eighteen hours. The  
test was made in the harbor at Toulon under  
the direction of the French Ministry of  
Marine.

The Argonauts are in command of Lieut.  
Bouquet. Her officers and crew suffered  
no hardship during the stay under water.  
The ministry is making other interesting  
and important experiments with the French  
submarines.

## GINGHAM HAND BAGS.

Some pretty gingham dresses shown in  
the shop are accompanied by hand bags of  
the same gingham, made up with metal  
frames. All the frame bags are flat. Some  
handsome bags are of white moire in flat  
envelope shape, fixed with a flat band of  
white silk braid, and finished with white  
cord and tassels.

The system of identification by fingers  
prints adopted in Japan toward the end of  
1908, is said to have proved successful. Offi-  
cial investigations show that out of 150,000  
finger prints recorded since the introduction  
of the system more than one hundred previous  
convictions have already been proved by this  
means during the present year alone. The  
police as well as the prison authorities will  
shortly make use of the system.

## HINT IN WAIST MAKING

An expert shirtwaist maker says that  
there is a fixed rule for the distance be-  
tween the shoulder seams in back and front.  
The neckband should be divided into three  
equal parts. The distance between the shoul-  
der seams across the front, on the neckband  
should measure exactly twice as much as the  
distance between the seams across the back.  
This proportion preserved, the shoulder  
seam will be kept in line and not only look  
well, but be comfortable to the wearer.

## LESS CHAMPAGNE FEWER DIAMONDS

Washington, June 25.—A wave of econ-  
omy is sweeping the country according to  
figures of the bureau of Statistics of the De-  
partment of Commerce and Labor, which  
disclose that Americans cut their imported  
champagne bill in two and adorned them-  
selves with few diamonds by \$7,000,000 wor-  
th during the last eleven months than in  
the same period last year. At the same  
time the United States increased its imports  
over the corresponding period of 1910 by  
more than \$145,000,000.

Diamonds valued at \$37,250,000 were  
brought in during the eleven months end-  
ing May, 1910 while the total for the simi-  
lar period just ended was only \$30,500,000.  
Champagne dropped from 6,000,000 to \$3,  
000,000; silk laces from \$5,000,000 to \$3,  
500,000 and dressed furs from \$10,000,000  
to \$7,000,000.

## TO PREVENT FADING.

To prevent black and white calico fading  
put three cupfuls of salt into four quarts of  
hot water, and as soon as the salt is dissolved  
while the water is still hot, put in the goods  
and leave until it cools.

## RUSSIA LAUNCHES FIRST DREAD NOUGHT.

St. Petersburg, June 29.—Russia's first  
dreadnought, the Sevastopol was launched  
successfully this noon from the Baltic works.  
The battleship was laid down on June 16  
1909 and it is expected that another two  
years will be occupied in equipping the vessel.  
The Sevastopol has a displacement of 23,000  
tons and with 42,000 horse power is expected  
to develop a speed of 24 knots an hour. Her  
length is 331 feet and the beam is 37 feet.

## TO WHITEN LACE

## PELAGIC SEALING TO BE ABOLISH- ED

Washington, June 29.—The International  
Fur Seal Conference has reached an agree-  
ment which will effectively put an end to  
pelagic sealing. Only the drafting of the for-  
mal treaty remains to be accomplished, and  
with an agreement on the points at issue it  
is not expected that this will require much  
time. The conference will end with all the  
parties thereto well satisfied with the re-  
sults and the enormous good which will re-  
sult from the abolition of pelagic sealing,  
which makes possible the practical conserva-  
tion of the fur seals.

Under the terms of the agreement which  
is to last for fifty years, the United States,  
Russia, and Japan will each contribute in  
skins thirty per cent of their catch to a gen-  
eral fund, although the Japan herds is so  
small as to make the contribution of that  
country a negligible quantity. This general  
fund will then be equally divided between  
Canada and Japan to indemnify them for  
the loss entailed by their abstention from  
pelagic sealing. Furthermore, the United  
States agrees to advance to Canada a cash bon-  
us of \$200,000 to be used for the reimburse-  
ment of the owners of the vessels engaged in  
pelagic sealing, but the equivalent in skins  
of the sum so advanced will be deducted  
from the percentage of the catch which the  
United States is to turn over to Canada in  
annual instalments until the entire amount  
shall have been repaid to the United States.

To guard against poaching and illicit pel-  
agic sealing the parties to the agreement pled-  
ge themselves to admit to their countries no  
seal skins which do not bear some mark  
which shall identify them as having been tak-  
en under the governments supervision of  
one or other of the contracting powers, and  
to treat as contraband such identified  
skins they may find in their borders. It  
is further agreed that steps shall be taken  
immediately to prevail on other countries  
like China, Mexico, Chili and Norway to in-  
stitute and enforce such regulations as will  
make it impossible for pelagic sealing to be  
conducted under their flags.

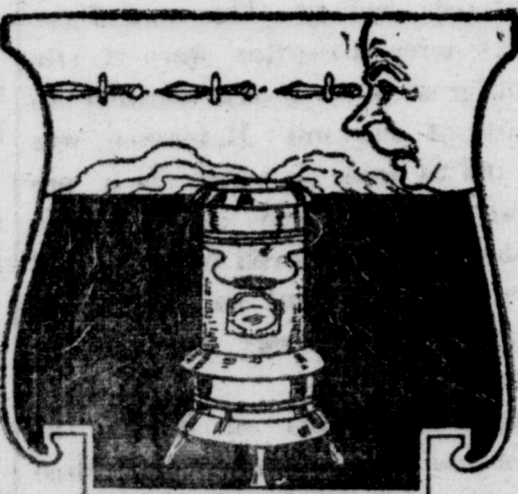
