BROOKLYN ATHENAEUM DAMAGED BY FIRE.

New York, June 30—The old Athenaeum, from whose platform Henry Ward Beecher delivered some of his famous orations, and which has been a Brooklyn landmark for the better part of a century, was gutted by fire last night, entailing a loss estimated at \$50,000. Its practical destruction leaves homeless the Court of Special Sessions which had occupied part of the structure for the past ten years.

An examination showed a fracture of the skull at the base. On Sunday morning and throughout the day he was resting as comfortable as could be expected. Early on Monday morning he took a bad turn and the doctor decided that an operation was necessary, which was performed at eleven o'clock by Dr Rankin, assisted by Drs Sprague and Grant.
