**BIG LOT OF SUPPLIES FOR
DR. GRENFELL**

New York, Aug 1—With supplies
of all sorts abroad for Dr Wilfred T
Grenfell, the Labrador missionary,
the two masted schooner George, B.
Cluett sailed today for Labrador.
The schooner will carry provisions
clothing and a full medical and surg-
ical outfit. It is equipped with two
auxiliary engines of 150 horse power
and will be manned by a crew of
seven men under Captain Mill. On
the way to St Anthony's the vessel
