The Rev J B Daggert had charge of the service assisted by the Rev Mr Schurman and the Rev J A Cahill. Mr Daggert read the 10th chapter of Romans. The Rev Mr Schurman preached from II Tim 4:6 I am now ready to be offered and the time of my departure is at hand. Both the chapter and text were chosen by Mr Perry. The Rev J A Cahill also made an address. Other ministers present were: Rev's Messrs Copeland, Johnson, Archer, and D w. The pall bearers were J T G Carr, J Barnett, Shepherd Boyer, D W Keith, George Grey and George Watson.

He leaves to mourn the loss of a kind and loving husband and father his wife who was formerly Miss Mary McBride, daughter of the late Thomas McBride of Bellville one son Kenneth two daughters the Misses Katie and Mabel an aged father James Dalling one of the earliest settlers of the place two brothers Hugh & Dalling of Woodstock, and Charles of Bangor and one Sister Mrs W S Sutton of Woodstock besides numerous other relatives and a host of friends.

The funeral which was an exceptionally large one was held on Wednesday afternoon last. Interment took place at the Presbyterian cemetery McKenzie Corner. Rev R A Macdonald was the officiating clergyman. The pall bearers were four cousins of the deceased Messrs Thos Watt, J Clark Watt James R Dalling and Augustus Kirk.

Mr Dalling was a prosperous farmer and highly respected citizen and a devout member of the Presbyterian church for about thirty years.

## MRS ELLEN MCGUIRE

The death occurred at the home of her daughter, May 11th., of Mrs Ellen McGuire at the advanced age of 96 years. She was in the very best of health till within a few days of her death.

She was one of the first settlers of Johnville. She and her husband, the late Charles McGuire, came to this place when it was only a wilderness. They settled where is now known as North Johnville and lived there until about four years ago when she went to live with her daughter with whom she was residing at the time of her death.

She was a woman of kind disposition and had a kind word for everybody that made her acquaintance. She leaves to mourn her loss, a daughter, Mrs John Dawson, and a son Hughie McGuire.

The funeral was held on Saturday morning, May 13th., at St John the Evangelist Church, where High Mass of Requiem was celebrated by Rev F. Ther Coughlin.

## NEHEMIAH CLARK

Nehemiah Clark, who had suffered a stroke of paralysis Friday morning, died at his home in Presque Isle Sunday about 5:00 o'clock in the afternoon. He had been in failing health the past two months, but previously had been remarkably well.

The funeral took place this Wednesday morning at the homestead, which is now lived in and carried on by Mr Clark's son Frank E Clark. Rev S M Bowles, pastor of the Methodist church of Fort Fairfield, officiated. The pall bearers were H L and O B Griffin and Lincoln and Eljah Bishop. Interment was made in Greenridge Cemetery.

Mr Clark was born in Ashland, Carleton County, N B., June 15, 1831, so that he would soon have been 80 years of age. He was married October 21, 1858, to Miss Emeline Rideout of Ashland who bore him nine children, all but two of whom are living, as follows: Willard E of Presque Isle; Blanchard and Richard R Fort Fairfield; James A and Frank E of Presque Isle; Hebert W Caribou; Wesley, Presque Isle.

Mr Clark was one of the best of Aroostook's citizens, always helpful, always honest, always cheerful and ready to be neighborly and to fill every position in life in which he was placed with fidelity, consideration and kindness. His was a life well rounded out, and he sinks to his rest amid the blessings of his neighbors and descendants.—Fort Fairfield Review.
