**THE DUKE DISCARDS.**  
The Duke of Bedford, one of the  
greatest of Britain's ground landlords  
has thrown up his hands. He fought  
the Lloyd-George land increment taxa-  
tion system to the last ditch with the  
tenacity of one in whose veins flows  
the blood of the Russells, who ven-  
tured everything to put Dutch Will-  
iam on the throne. But his Grace  
knows when he is beaten. It was not  
merely a small reform in taxation  
that Lloyd-George brought about  
when he placed upon the statute  
book a law providing that a part of  
the future increase in the value of  
land—other than purely agricultural  
holdings—should go to the State. The  
adoption of the law and its ratifica-  
tion by the people at a general election  
meant that Britain proposes hereaf-  
ter to penalize the holding of land  
out of use and to encourage the re-  
turn of the people to the land.

The Duke of Bedford is the first of  
the great landlords to recognize the  
handwriting on the wall. Mr Walter  
Long has been selling his Wiltshire es-  
tates, but they are not in the same  
class as the patrimony of the Russells.  
The announcement is made that the  
greatest part of the Devonshire estate  
of the Duke of Bedford will be sold  
next month by public auction. It is  
a huge property; embracing most of  
the land around Taunton, some sub-  
urban areas around Plymouth con-  
taining many fine building sites, and  
over 13,000 acres of land, with fine  
farm houses and hundreds of laborers  
cottages upon it.

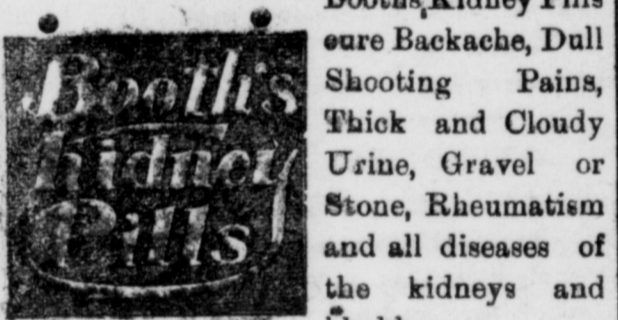
The sale will afford thousands of  
Englishmen, who before the passage  
of the Lloyd-George Budget had no  
more chance of owning a foot of their  
native soil than of buying real estate  
in Mars, the opportunity of purchas-  
ing the land on which they have  
made their homes or on which they  
propose to build. By discarding his  
landed estates and turning them in-  
to money the Duke shrewdly shifts  
upon the new owners the responsibil-  
ity for paying to the public purse a  
part of the future increase of value.  
But they will in their bids take  
this contingent liability into account,  
and the Duke is not likely to get as  
much for his property as he would  
have obtained before the taxation of  
the increment of land became a fixed  
part of the fiscal policy of the country.  
The significance of the Bedford  
sales can scarcely be overestimated.  
It is the beginning of the physical and  
moral salvation of the people of Great  
Britain by a return to the land under  
conditions that will induce them to  
make the fullest and best possible use  
of it—Toronto Globe.

**AN ANCIENT CITY IN ARIZONA**  
(Chicago Tribune)  
Still another 'oldest city in the world' has  
been discovered. When T. Hewitt Myring  
found vases in Peru in ruins which were said  
to be 7000 years old it was imagined that the  
remains of early civilizations had been pushed  
as far into antiquity as they would ever go.  
But A. Lafave, a mining engineer, has  
found the relics of a town in an Arizona  
tableland near Phoenix which he insists are  
at least 10,000 years old. The buildings are  
on a level stretch of country where neither  
silt nor wash was possible, and yet the ruins  
were covered with 10 feet of prairie dust,  
which the discoverer claims required ages to  
accumulate.

The buildings of sandstone show great  
architectural skill and in the walls were found  
a box of cotton balls and a sealed jar of corn  
both well preserved. The Arizona climate  
does not permit the growth of cotton in the  
present age, so Mr. Lafave assumes that  
sufficient time must have elapsed since the  
cotton which he found was grown to have  
wrought a complete change in the character  
of the country. This period he also gauges  
as something like 10,000 years.  
He is satisfied that the ruins are older than  
those of Nineveh or Babylon. He believes  
that the race which built this town was pos-  
sessed of a high civilization from the abun-  
dance of artistically wrought pottery and that  
it subsequently was broken up by internal  
dissension and possibly degenerated into  
the cliff dwelling tribes.

**CHANGES IN WOMEN'S FOOTWEAR**  
Henry W Johnston, who died recently at  
Lynn, Mass., is described as the inventor of
