

COOKERY RECIPE.

Sardines on Tesst. -- This may be served for the family lancheon, or for a chafing dish supper. Turn out a small box of sard nes, free them from bones, and seperate with a fork into a small pieces. Melt four tables poonfuls of butter, add one third of a cupfu of sof, stale bread crumbs and stir until well b'ended; then add one cupful of rich mi'k. Bring to the boiling point and add two hard boiled eggs finely chopped and the sardines, Season with salt pepperi and paprika, Serve hot on pieces of buttered toast and garnish with parsley.
