**ST STEPHEN WOMAN'S HERD OF CATTLE SLAIN IN BOSTON**

Boston, June 3—Mrs Mary Botterell, a wealthy St Stephen woman, lost a valuable herd of cattle she had shipped to this country under the special protection of a tourists agency.

The cattle were killed and thrown from the decks of the steamer Menominee because the United States government refuses to allow cattle from Switzerland to land in this country owing to the prevalence of foot and mouth disease in that republic.

Before the three cows, two calves, two bulls and a bullock were killed and thrown overboard, however, the wires between St Stephen, Montreal and Boston were kept hot with messages endeavoring to stay the executions while Mr Botterell's son who was in Montreal, attempted to reach this city in time to make some other arrangements. But before Mr Botterell arrived the cattle were slain and the car cases dumped overboard.

**U.S. SQUADRON CRUISE ON GREAT LAKES ABANDONED.**

Detroit, Mich., June 3—There will be no squadron cruise of naval militia on the Great Lakes this summer accordance to an announcement from the War Department yesterday afternoon. The inside of the situation, it is learned from naval officers, is this: Every time a naval demonstration has taken place on the Great Lakes there has been a corresponding agitation in Canada over the increase of United States armament on the lakes. Canada has already protested against the alleged violation of the treaty against the maintenance of warships on the Great Lakes, and has several times hinted that while naval reserve ships were being styled "training ships" and not "naval vessels," still they were in reality warships and could be so constructed if the matter were ever made the subject of diplomatic inquiry. The fear is that such action may be taken by Canada, and it is regarded as better at this time to hold no squadron cruise on the lakes therefore, lest the continued agitation in Canada may lead to the complete abandonment of armed craft of the naval militia type on these waters.

**WORK ON DRIVES IS STARTING AGAIN AFTER THE RAIN**

Fredericton June 2nd.—The heavy rains of the past day or two has had the effect of raising the water in the up river sections and crews have gone to work on the drives which have been hung up.

The Astland Milling Co's drive on the Aroostook in charge of Herbert Aitken of this city, got into safe waters on Sunday last. This drive contains about thirteen million feet of lumber. The report from up the river today are as follows:

Edmundston—Weather cool and raining. St Leonards—The river rose sixteen inches last night; heavy rains yesterday and this morning crews went to work on the drives again.

Grand Falls—Weather cloudy; have had heavy rains and it is not yet over; river rising and logs running thickly.

Andover—Cool and raining; water came up about six inches last night. Woodstock—Quite a few logs are running cloudy with some rain; cool.
