LONDON, Sept. 6.-Mrs Katherine Cecil Thurston, the Irish authoress, was found dead this morning at a hotel in Cork. Mrs Thurston was a native of Cork and married in 1901, Mr. Ernest Charles Thurston, with whom she was the joint author of several popular novels. The couple lived happily until 1907, when according to Mrs. Thurston, her husband informed her that it was necessary that he should live his own life, and for the purpose of literary work should go down into the very depths of society. The authoress was granted a divorce in the spring of 1910.

(Mrs. Thurston was the daughter of Paul Madden, an ex-Mayor of Cork. She was the author of "John Chilcote, M. P.," which proved a great success and was dramatized by her husband. It was known in America as "The Mas" querader. Other novels were "The Circle," "The Gambler," "The fly on the Wheel." Her latest novel, "Max," has been very successful.

New York Pelice In Luck A

Last

NEW YORK, Sept. 6. - With a dapper young Italian, believed to be one of the country's master criminals in their hands, the police to-day spread their nets for the gang of bomb throwers, blackmailers and kidnappers that have terrorized the Italian settlement here for the past four years. Giuseppi Constabile, who was arrested yesterday with a dynamite bomb under his coat, will be arraigned to-day under the new law which makes the mere possession of a deadly weapon a felony, but the police hope to prove against him far more serious crimes.

Wireless Marconi Working On Telegraphy

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., Sept. 6.-Plans for the erection of a wireless station of sufficient power to allow steamers plyng between Europe and America to keep in constant and direct communication with land have been formulated by inventor Marconi, who has been conducting experiments here for the past few days. The erection of the proposed station is expected to be started within a few weeks and its completion will make St. John's the distributing point for all wireless messages between England and America, and other stations merely subsidiary, Marconi will leaves for England to-morrow to make final arrangements.

Yesterday a lengthy message addressed to Premier Morris, was received from the wireless station at Clifden, Ireland, by means of a temporary station on the proposed site for the new power station here.

Making Money Aroostook

(Bangor Commercial.)

HOULTON, Sept. 6.—They are making money in Aroostook county this season and before New Year shall have arrived, a good many farm mortgages will have been cancelled and a good many bank accounts will have increased. In some instance they will have become so fat that the fortunate possessors may not feel that a couple of months or so in Southern California or Bermuda will not be amiss. The potato crop is a good one and in Aroostook a good potato harvest spells prosperity for all. The last two years have been made lean ones. But the present season will go far to make up for that.

"Conditions have been almost ideal, up to date, for the proper growth and maturing of the potato crop," said E. L. Cleveland, one of the largest potato shippers in Maine, to the Commercial correspondent. "The shipping season began nearly three weeks earlier than usual by reason of the shortage of the outside supply of potatoes. There is an exceedingly heavy demand for Aroostook potatoes from a wide territory. We are shipping freely now to Chicago, St. Louis, Cincinnati, Cleveland and other western points. The stock, while not fully matured by reason of early digging, is sound, of good size and of excellent table quality.

"There is at present a tremendous movement of potatoes out of the county. It is estimated that fully \$2,000,000 has already been paid to the farmer hereabouts. Prices have ranged high. At present they vary from \$1.75 to \$1.85 per barrel at the loading stations.

"The prospects are for a very busy for another month-until their main recently.
