Bordeaux Sauce

This is an excellent relish, and easily made. Take four quarts of cabbage, sliced fine, two quarts of green tomatoes sliced thin, six large onions, three red peppers, two ounces of white mustard seed, one-half ounce of tumeric root, one half ounce celery seed, two and one half pounds of sugar, one gill of salt, and two quarts of vinegar. Have prepared the cabbage, onions, tomatoes, and peppers, and thoroughly stir in the rest. Mix well together, and let stand one half hour then put on stove in a granite kettle and boil for twenty minutes. Does not have to be hermetically sealed.

Cream Cheese

Put five quarts of rich milk in a pan with two teaspoonfuls of rennet, or use the rennet tablets to be had of the druggist as directed on package. Let set until the curd forms, when it should be broken down with a skimmer, and left to stand for two hours. Spread a cheese cloth on a sieve and drain the curd by turning it into the cloth lined sieve, breaking the curd with the hand, and when drained, put it into a vat with a two pound weigh on the cover, and leave for twelve hours; then bind with a fillet or band around the sides. Turn every day until dry, rubbing the outside with a little sweet butter, cover with green leaves and leave to ripen.

Magnificent Villa Unearthed In Pompeii

Stockholm, Aug. 6.—Dr. Johann Bergman, an archaeologist who recently returned from Italy, says the Italian authorities are now excavating the most magnificent villa that has yet been found at Pompeii. The Villa, of which only ten rooms have been laid bare, was accidentally discovered by workmen employed in vineyards.

One of the rooms is practically uninjured. It is as large as a fair sized hall and contains a beautiful mosaic floor, while the walls are decorated with the most perfect frescoes ever seen at Pompeii. These paintings constitute a series of life sized human figures, not less than twenty nine in number. They are executed in an unrivaled fashion. From the style of the painting it is evident that the villa belongs to the period of Augustus, 30 or 20 B. C.

People are even inhibited from photographing any object in the Villa, which is in charge of an official custodian.

Only three villas of similar character have been found outside Pompeii, the first was the Diomedes villa, which was discovered in the year 1700; the second was the Boscoreale villa in 1885, on which occasion ninety six silver vessels were found. These vessels were purchased for the Louvre for 50,000 francs. Last of all was the great villa near Boscoreale, with twenty four rooms containing many fine wall paintings in a damaged condition. The newly discovered villa surpasses all the others not only as regards size but in the artistic value and remarkably preserved state of its wall paintings.

Farm Topics

Clover Seed Very Scarce

The clover seed situation throughout both the United States and Canada is nothing short of alarming. The very general failure last season of a clover catch leaves the farmer with few fields that can be cut for seed. Consequently there will be a stringent shortage before another seeding time. Every reader who has a second crop that looks at all promising should do his best to save it for seed either for sale, or to save buying at prices that promise to be exorbitantly high.

Diameter of Silos

Silos twenty feet in diameter are as large as it is prudent to build, says Hoard's Dairyman, and should be not less than thirty feet in depth.

The Hog And His Care

(From Hoard's Dairyman)
Clover and skim milk are almost indispensable in the ration of the growing pig.

If the pig is stinted in its food at any stage of its life, it can never become a perfect pork producer.

One way to improve land rapidly is to pasture hogs upon it. Too many farmers have failed to appreciate the possibilities of rye as hog pasture.

There is no feed better for young pigs and calves than sweet skim milk right from the separator.

Pigs, sows, and fattening hogs should be kept in separate inclosures. They will be healthier and derive more benefit from their feeds by such handling.

Sows that come from prolific families are more certain to inherit those qualities and become good mothers than those that descend from families that are less prolific.

Where it is possible, it is best to defer selection of sow pigs for the breeding herd until they have considerable growth.

Give the sow a movable house in the pasture just before farrowing time, as the youngsters will thrive on the grass. If she farrows in the fall the quiet of the pasture is just what she needs.

Alaskan Prospectors In Sore Plight

Valdez, Alaska, Aug. 8.—Acted by signals of distress from Bardwell Island, a barren rock near the entrance to Resurrection Bay, the steamship Bertha, on August 2, sent out a small boat and took off two aged and starved men, Charles Alexander and Alvin Anderson. The men had been on the island for two months and would have perished but for the coming of the Bertha. News of the rescue reached here today.

Two vessels passed without noticing their signals of distress.

The Cedars of Lebanon

(Harper's Weekly.)

Very carefully closed and guarded are two hundred remaining cedars of Lebanon, those famous trees that once clothed all the sides of the Syrian mountains. So tall and beautiful were they in comparison with the trees of Palestine that the Hebrew writers celebrated them with extraordinary praise, and from the earliest times their soft, white wood was the glory of Jewish architecture. They were used in Solomon's temple and in its successor, and also in the church that Constantine built at Jerusalem.

The surviving trees are called by the Arabs the "trees of God," and under their wide spreading branches, the clergy of the Greek church occasionally celebrate mass.

Several of the trees in the grove are over fifteen hundred years old, and have a height of one hundred feet and a circumference of fifty. In appearance they more resemble the aged larch or the majestic oak than the cedar that is known in America.

Russian Intolerance

The refusal of the holy Russian synod to allow the Baptist to erect a college and seminary in the empire, the further news that the perfect of Moscow has ordered the police to exercise special vigilance over the attempts of sectarians (the Baptists) to inveigle orthodox Russians from the state church, shed some light on the narrow intolerance which pervades the mediæval empire.

"Infant Paralysis Still Incurable"

Albany, Aug. 6.—No treatment so far as is known which can be regarded as specific or even effective has been found in dealing with the problem of infantile paralysis, according to Dr. Simon Flexner, of New York, who has been making a special study of the disease. At a conference here of medical officers under the auspices of the State Department of Health, Dr. Flexner, among other things, gave the following views in discussing infantile paralysis:

Indications already seem unmistakable and point to a recurrence of the disease this year. The disease is still alive over a considerable portion of the State.

Our greatest concern is to determine how and under what circumstances the disease is spread. There is no treatment so far as we know which can be regarded as specific or even effective. It is easily transmitted from animals to man and is more fatal in animals than in man. One attack, however light, appears to establish an immunity against a second attack.

It is due to a specific micro organism, the propagation of which in the body appears to bring about a reaction establishing an immunity.

It is important to determine whether or not animals might suffer primarily from this disease. Should they so suffer, the disease could be transferred in monkeys and the true character of the disease demonstrated. It is possible that this disease may be transmitted by insects. The fly and the mosquito would be most quickly suspected of being the carriers of this infection. Flies fed on the simiulord of a monkey that has died from this disease have been known to be able to transmit the same disease to other monkeys.

The period of incubation appears to be the period of infectiousness of the disease, after which it is not thought that infection emanates from the case.

The source of entrance of the germs of this disease appears to be through the upper air passages, especially the nose. It would also appear that the most probable means of exit of this germ is through the nose and throat. It is therefore, very important that the discharges from the nose and throat of cases suffering from infantile paralysis be properly destroyed.

During the year 1910, 322 cases of infantile paralysis in forty nine counties were reported to the State Department of Health. This shows a wide distribution of the disease, with no apparent relation to any central focus.
