When Extension Coupon of Certificate has been signed at Winnipeg by a Farmer showing holder has engaged to work as Farm Laborer it will be honored prior to September 30th, for Free Ticket to any Canadian Pacific Railway Station in Manitoba or Saskatchewan, and including Moose Jaw and Saskatoon. West of Moose Jaw and Saskatoon to Calgary, McLeod and Edmonton, Tickets will be issued FREE to Moose Jaw and Saskatoon, and at rate of One Cent per mile beyond.

The Verification Certificate will, if presented on or before November 30th, 1911, and on payment of the Returning Rate as shown above, entitle purchaser to Second-Class Ticket good to return from Moose Jaw, Saskatoon, or any Station East thereof in territory above stated to original starting point, by same route as travelled on going journey. Los Angeles Call

East North field, Mass, Aug. 9—It became known here today that the Rev. Dr. R. A. Torrey, well known as an evangelist has received a call to become dean of the International Bible Institute at Los Angeles (Cal.) Dr. Torrey was accepted. He will take up his duties when he returns from an extended evangelistic tour abroad.

The trustees of the Institute, the largest of its kind in the country and absolutely international, have promised to build an auditorium to seat 3,000 persons. Dr. Torrey will depart for Europe on board the Coronado Aug. 26. He is to hold services at Dublin, Bristol, Dundee, Cambridge University and Limerick. The trustees of the Los Angeles Institute have voted Dr. Torrey a three months' vacation each year, so he can still keep up his summer Bible conference work.

TO BE BIGGEST TRUST CONCERN IN AMERICA

(Montreal Star, Aug. 10.)

What is to be the largest trust company received its formal ratification yesterday, when shareholders of the Bankers and Mercantile Trust companies of New York met and voted in favor of the recent plan to merge the two institutions.

In volume of deposits, the new company which will come out of the present two surpasses any other single trust company. Between them, they now have \$110,000,000 of deposits; the Guaranty Trust Company which is now the largest institution of its kind in New York city, has less than \$100,000,000.

There are only three national banks in New York which have larger net deposits than \$100,000,000—the National City, Bank of Commerce and the First National. The Bankers' and the Mercantile Trust have been members of what is known as the "Morgan group" of banks, and have grown rapidly in recent years.

UNCLE SAM STARTS ANOTHER INQUIRY REHIGH COST OF LIVING

Washington, Aug. 11—The bureau of labor is conducting a country-wide investigation of the range of retail prices of commodities of life during the last ten years. The results will not be fully known for probably a year.

Investigators of the bureau recently made a comprehensive report of the whole sale prices of commodities during the last ten years which showed a steady increase all along the line. The department of agriculture has just issued a report on the prices of farm products tending to show that prices paid to the farmer have been growing less.

When the complete results of the third investigation, now under way, are made public, a comprehensive view of the high cost of living problem will be available from all angles.

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Sent Wireless Message From Quebec To Poldhu

Montreal, Aug. 13—Guglielmo Marconi, inventor of the wireless telegraph, arrived here yesterday aboard the steamship Laurentic. In an interview he stated that he was experimenting with the apparatus aboard the vessel on the voyage and managed to keep in touch with Poldhu, the station on the Cornish coast, the entire way across.

He established a new record for transmission of 2,622 miles sending a message from Quebec to Poldhu. He is accompanied by his wife, and they spent the day in the city, but will at once proceed to Glace Bay, where the inventor will continue his work.

Looks Like More Trouble In Spain

CADIZ, Spalo, Aug. 10—In protest against the execution of the mutineers on board the battleship Numancia, the entire life of the city has been suspended. Stores and other business houses were closed yesterday, street car lines were stopped and streamers of mourning were draped on the balconies of houses. A procession of laborites marched to the palace of the governor and voiced their sentiments against the execution.

MADRID, Aug 10—Reports that arms have been found on the seamen of the cruiser Catalana and the gunboat Extremadura, lead to the belief there is a wide spread revolutionary plot against the government. A note issued by the navy officials in reference to the mutiny on board the Numancia, speaks of only one execution which it says was carried out on the high seas.
