#### Carmen Join in London Strike

London, Aug. 8-The carmen joined the others strikers on the London docks today and union efficials claim that 70,000 men are now affected. Work on the South side of the Thames River is at a standstill. Ships lave arrived in large numbers during the last few days with full cargoes, large y of consignments of goods for London houses, but there is no one to unlead the vessels. Cargoes of meat in refrigerating chambers are still unspoiled, but the supplies of coal to operate the freezing plants are rapidly disappearing and the strikers will not permit the reptenish mant of the fuel supply. The strikers are peaceful but ugly threate are made regrading the fate of non unionists who attempt to work. #### The Useful Dye-Pot.

For the gil who wishes to dye her own things, says a wil er in Women's Home Com panion, the following important rules will be found useful.

A lapots mu t be removed from the fabric about to be re-colored, as they are apt to re sist the dye and show more plainly after col oring. If the materials are while or very light cream, pink, blue, or green, they can be dyed almost any coler. But when they are of a medium or dark shade, the question of color must be carefully considered. Red will take a darker shade of red or brown, or a purple bath will produce reddish purple or plum. Brown c.n be changed to a darker brown or a catawba resuls from the use of crimson or garnet. Cardinal red applied to a very light green becomes a crimson or gar net, and darker greens can be c lored deeper shades of green, brown and tlack.

Fabric cout imng stripes or plaids in var. ous co.ors do not color as well as these which are a solid shade. In such fabric the pattern is apt to show after recoioring. It is wie at pred mi at ug color. It the pattern exists mercly in the weares, it has no effect upon

Crepe de Ch ne and and the other light wash si ks are simple to dye, but when color ing toff sta and the heavier salks, stir well so that the dye fluid will permeate the fabric.

# Ways Of Preparing Chicken

Chicken is by far the best meat for sum mer eatug. Chicken shortcakes are much better than chicken pie and very much more simple in the making. Cu: the chicken up put it in a pan and cover it with water, or with water and mi k. Let it stew genily un til the chicken is tender and the I quor wel cooked down. Make the gravy of milk, thicken wi h flour; dia piece of bu ter an i pepper and sait. Have ready a pair of short cakes made of tiscuit crust rather short. Cut into squares and lay them on a warm dish; add the chick n and pour the gravy over white both are het.

To prepare jellied chicken, bo l in a very ittle water a chicken unt li is so tender tha the most waltel from the bones. Chop or treak the meat into rather fine bits and sea son it well. Fill a mould wit the chicken and with sleed hard boiled ages, in alternate lay ers. Boildown the broth until it measures about one pint, then add to .t a scant tall spoon of gesatine. When the gelatine is thor oughly dissolved, pour over the chicken in the mouid and set away to harden.

# ININE LOCOMOTIVES BURNED AT CALAIS

St Stephen, N B., Aug 9 .- The workshops and round house of the Washing ton County Railway at Sal mon Falls Calais, were! burned this morning involving a less of \$110,000. The fire started in one of the pits of the round house and spread rapidly. Only one of theten locomotives in the building was got cut and it was used to save some of the cars that were near but eight freight cars were burned and nine passenger coaches were bad ly scorched. The buildings were just opposite the St Croix Cotton Mill and were erected two or three years ago. The road has sirce been taken over by the Maine Central and the shpos will probably not be rebuilt.

## The Physiology Of Sleep

(Fred W Eastman in the July Atlan tic.)

Sleep is no longer indefinitely considered a wandering abroad of the scul, but is now known to be a temportry poisoning of the brain-cells by the waste products resulting duriug the day from the activity of the body cells in general. Thus when amuscle cell or a nerve cell acts, nutritive matarial stored within its walls is broken down into sul stances that are of no value and merely impede further action of the cell unless less ren oved. Normally these waste products are wasled cut by the blood stream which at the same time provides new cell-food and is finally itself purified by the excretory organs-the lungs and the kidneys. In the course of the day however production is in excess of removal and then the clegging effect of these substances is manifested by fatigue in muscles and brain the extreme degree of which results in the latter organ, in the inability to act, which we know as the party of eight men ate and sleep.
